Laughton, is the insane husband of  
Tallulah Bankhead, who construes  
every move she makes to mean a  
hidden signal to her lover. He even  
sinks a submarine to get revenge  
on his rival, Gary Cooper.

Now and then we see a picture  
which appeals to us not because

scenes, excellent camera work, and

type is "Igloo." The title is self-
