## Mitchell Gives **Expense Survey On Dormitories**

In a paper entitled "Dormitories and Dormitory Management" prepared by Colonel John E. Mitchell, some interesting figures on the cost of erecting and operating a modern dormitory are available. It is doubtful that many students

realize the outlay of funds that is necessary to provide healthful and comfortable living condition for those who are members of the student body.. The following figures were taken from Colonel Mitchell's paper and pertain to Walton Hall. Original cost of Walton


