

### AGGIE DEBATERS BEGIN WORK ON DEBT QUESTION

Debate Team Begins Practice On Pi Kappa Delta War Debt Problem.

In anticipation of a season that promises to be an exceedingly active one, members of the debating team began an intensive program of study and practice this week on the current Pi Kappa Delta ques-

tion. Resolved: That the United States should agree to the cancellation of Inter-Allied war debts, according to an announcement recently made by C. O. Spriggs, faculty sponsor.

Three practice debates have been scheduled this week. The first was held last night in room 316 Academic Building, between an affirmative team composed of I. A. Handler, Galveston, and R. B. Jenkins, DeLeon, and a negative team made up of D. T. Lusk, Scotia, N. Y., and J. E. Gaston, Henderson. Tonight, D. L. Tisinger, Garland, and J. W. Wells, San Antonio, are to take the negative side of the question against G. E. Wyse, Palestine, and H. N. Irvine, Ft. Worth. Friday night, N. E. Khazam, Bagdad, Iraq, and R. E. Porter, San Antonio, are to argue negatively in a debate with W. O. Vela, Laredo, and J. B. Heinen, Dallas.

concentration of students eliminated eight tables and the supernumeraries among the waiters were cut to the smallest possible number bringing the total number of eliminations to twenty-one, and leaving eighty-six students to serve the entire corps at each meal.

No starch in shirts or trousers is the new economy measure adopted by the college laundry to meet the budget reduction, according to B. D. Marburger, superintendent of buildings and college utilities. The laundry is now operating with an income of one dollar per student less than last year and by eliminating starching from the laundering process it is able to function under its allotment of funds. Each student now pays \$1.70 per month for laundry work, Mr. Marburger stated.


