They are Jack Gray, flashy forward and the loop's leading scorer, and Kubricht, center, who is playing his last game under the Orange and White spangles of Texas University. Both of them to date have been the most outstanding men in the conference at their respective positions. Gray is a sophomore with two more years of competition ahead of him. A Texas guard, Captain Ed Price, has also been one of the leading players, and will probably receive several All-Conference votes.

In the games between the Longhorns and Aggies for the past two seasons, Captain Moody has been the high scorer in each contest. Though the Farmers were defeated in the last encounter, the Aggie

captain took scoring honors for the game. With probably five of the most outstanding conference performers matched against each other in this last game, Moody, Roberts, Gray, Kubricht, and Merka, it promises to be a thrilling curtain closer for the 1933 basketball season.

Other Aggies who will probably see service in the game include Ray Murray, Mercedes; "Frenchy" Stansel, Greydan, Louisiana; Earl Shepherd, Port Arthur; and Griffin Brozazale, Crockett.
