

**MAYO WRITES A PLAY ABOUT LIFE ON AGGIE CAMPUS**

The Play Will Have a Cast of Over One Hundred Students and Will Be Presented in the Assembly Hall in the Spring.

"A vaudeville put on by the students and for students is the aim of the play about A. and M. life I have just written," said Dr. T. F. Mayo, college librarian, yesterday.

The chief characters are: Hector Hinkel, a country aggie from Blazing Star, Texas; Mary Wendel, also of Blazing Star; Walter Binson, a city aggie from Dallas; and Evelyn Searcy, a student of Vassar College. Over a hundred parts are to be filled by A. and M. students and girls from Bryan and College Station.

Direction is to be by the following self-appointed committees:

Dr. V. P. Lee, head of the marketing and finance department, chairman; C. O. Spriggs, professor of public speaking, and Bob Erisman, cadet from Fort Worth, stage directors and coaches; Dr. Mayo, and J. F. Hilliard, a graduate student, manuscript directors; Carl Palmer, instructors in electrical engineering, lighting; Earpest Langford, head of the architectural department, scenery; and Lieutenant Anderson and Honk Irwin, vaudeville stunts.

The present plan is to have the cast and preliminary arrangements completed by the end of the first term. The first act will be presented in the assembly hall about March 1st in order that the student body may see it and offer suggestions before the finished performance is given about April 1st.

If the play is a success, it is planned to offer a similar play depicting A. and M. life each year, with new features introduced. After this year, everything connected with the play will be done by the students themselves, Dr. Mayo said.

Anyone who can twirl a rope, play an accordion, sing or entertain in any way should try out, because the more interest that is shown in the play the better it will be.

Twelve copies of the manuscript will be at the loan desk of the library during October, and those interested in trying out for the play are urged to read one of the copies, and (without memorizing) familiarize themselves with the part he is interested in, Dr. Mayo added.

Though Mr. Spriggs will announce the exact hour and place, it is expected that the tryout will begin about November 1st.

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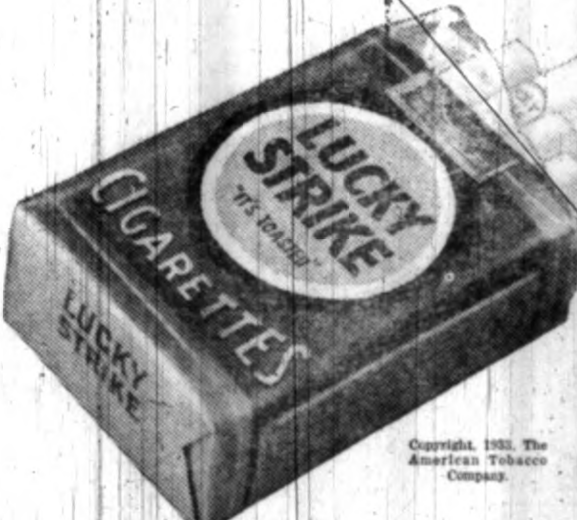
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
