AGGIE RIFLEMEN VICTORS IN ALL BUT ONE MATCH

Tosch Is High Point Man On Aggie Team; Marksmen Prime for Eighth Corps Area Match February 19.

As a result of their first match this season, the A and M rifle team won over Ohio State ROTC, Rose Polytechnic, Rhode Island State, University of Wichita, Knox College, South Carolina Presbyterian College, and Davidson College, losing only one of the nine to Ohio State University.

A return match was held with Ohio State University last week to revenge the first loss. Matches were also held with Yale, Drexel Institute, University of Georgia, North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering, Missouri School of Mines, New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts. Only three of the teams have been heard from, the Aggies winning all: Oklahoma A and M, Missouri School of Mines, Yale, West Virginia University, and Nebraska.

The five high men on the Aggie five-man team in the order they finished last week were: C. A. Tosch, Mesquite, captain; T. J. Guerdum, San Antonio; O. A. Seward, Amarillo; Roy Huffaker, San Antonio; and W. S. Sinclair, Galveston. The squad was cut to twenty-seven Monday.

Seven collegiate teams are scheduled next week, though most of the next two weeks will be devoted to practicing for the Eighth Corps Area match, which will begin February 19.

Prof Devises Plan To Remedy Unemploy'm't

By College News Service NEW YORK.—Establishment of a master occupational plan to provide jobs for practically every man and woman in the United States is advocated by Professor Harold F. Clark of Columbia University.

Writing in the Occupations Magazine, Dr. Clark declared that his proposed plan would take care of, not only the present unemployed, but also the some 2,000,000 persons who enter occupational life each year.

He recommended the creation of a central bureau to gather information regarding jobs in all sections of the country. Means would be provided, he said, for shifting persons from one community to another to satisfy the needs of the different localities.
