

Farmers Defeat Arkansas Quintet In Second Game 35-23

Both Teams Are Eliminated From Conference Race

Merka High Point Man in Second Game; Johnny Davis and Taylor Wilkins Outstanding.

After failing by only one point to tie the University of Arkansas razorbacks in the first game of the two game series Monday night, the Aggies came back strong Tuesday night to trounce the same Razorback quintet by a score of 35 to 23, after having held a decisive lead all during the game with the exception of the time when both teams were tied at five all. The score of the Monday night game was Arkansas 23, A and M 22.

In the first game, both teams were cold and played slowly and sluggishly during the entire first half, the score being knotted at 7 points each at the intermission. Then after the second half started, Moody and Poole of Arkansas made their shots count and slowly but surely forged ahead of the Cadets. At one time, with only about seven minutes left to play, the Razorbacks held an eight point lead, the score being 23-15. At this time the Aggies, led by Taylor Wilkins, began a rally and brought the score to within one point of the leading Razorbacks. With only thirty seconds to play, an Aggie try for a field goal, the making of which would have put the Cadets in the lead, circled around the hoop and after seeming to balance for a few seconds fell on the outside. Arkansas recovered the ball and held it until the whistle blew ending the game.

Tuesday night both teams started out considerably faster than they did Monday night but the Aggies showed a complete reversal of form and took the lead at the beginning of the game and never once let the Razorbacks come into the lead in score although after

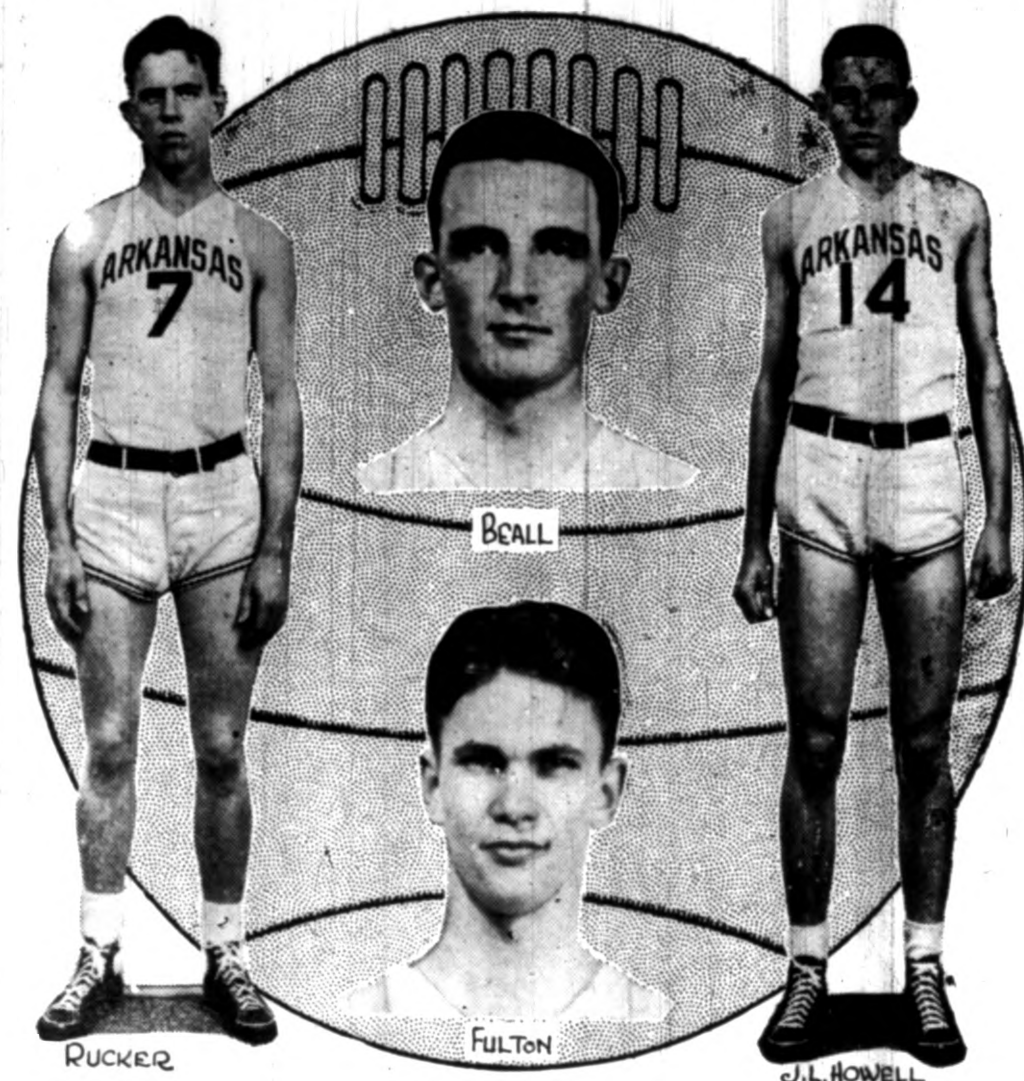

At the first quarter the score was 10-4; at the half, 20-6; and at the third quarter, 24-0. During the last quarter, Trinity rallied to make eight points but otherwise did not seriously threaten the first year Cadets.

Ed Lee, Houston, stellar forward and Pete Dowling, also of Houston, tall center, were the mainstays of the victory for the freshmen.
