

BASEBALL TEAM MEETS AMATEUR NINE SATURDAY

First action of the 1934 Aggie baseball team will be seen next Saturday afternoon as Coach R. G. Higginbotham puts his squad through the first practice game of the season. The opponents have not been definitely decided upon but will probably be some amateur team from Houston.

Although rain and cold weather hampered baseball practice the latter part of last week, the squad trained under the stadium and held a number of blackboard meetings. Fair baseball weather greeted the Aggies this week and they were able to work out on the diamond Monday for the first time in several days.

Bill Sodd was "layin' em against the fence" in batting practice this week and looks as though he will again make things tough for Southwest conference pitchers. Bob Connoley, who held down third base for the Aggies last year and who hit .370 in the conference, was hitting the ball to all parts of the lot Monday afternoon. Ike Lowenstein is also showing up well in batting.

Coach Higginbotham is grooming his ace pitchers "Jake" Mooty and "Bugga" Moon for heavy duty by allowing them to bear down more in practice since the weather has reached baseball temperature.

Singh and Haddad Discuss Religions

Spain of S M U made 19 of his season's total of 23 points in the two games against T C U.

Perkins of T C U made two points all season; these two points were made in the winning field goal that he shot against Rice in Houston Feb. 13.

T C U, with the winning of the Rice game in Fort Worth Feb. 28, ran its home victories to 18 consecutive. The Frogs have not lost a basketball game on the home court since Feb. 28, 1931. That one was to Baylor and the Frogs won the conference championship that year.

Arkansas won one and lost one with every team in the conference. The Porkers won the first game and lost the second of every pair played except with Texas; in that series the Longhorns won the first and Arkansas the second game.

The 1934 season saw but one 1-point game. It was played at College Station Feb. 19 and the score was, Arkansas 23, A and M 22.

The game was a rough affair from the start to finish. A total of 33 personal fouls were committed with 18 charged to the Fish and 15 to the All-Stars. Pete Dowling, fish center, and Curtis Cobb, visitor forward, were taken out of the game on fouls. Each team made 11 points on charity shots.

The All-Stars were composed of a much more experienced group of players than the Freshmen, some of whom were McNeely, a member of the A and M freshman team two years ago; Curtis Cobb member of the A and M varsity a few years ago; Cloud, a letterman from Baylor, and Lang and Carroll both on the 1932 Bryan team, the latter making all-state that year.

Track Team Will Enter Ft. Worth Stock Show Meet

Two Men Entered in Each Event in An Effort to Win; Coach Andy is Enthused Over Chances.

The Texas Aggie Track Team will enter its second meet of the season Saturday, March 17, when it journeys to Fort Worth to enter the meet to be held at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show. Members of the team will leave here Thursday, March 15, in order to take part in the preliminaries to be held Friday.

The Aggie team will enter two men in every event in an effort to cop high honors. All the men to make this trip will be selected next Saturday in an intersquad meet with the exception of the weight men who will have their competition meet Wednesday.

Outstanding performances to date by members of the team have been made by Roy Cook, who ran the half mile in 2:01.8, with R. E. Taylor only two yards behind him. John Herring, who ran the low hurdles in 24 seconds, was only .6 of a second behind the conference record set by Charley Casper of T C U. Other outstanding performances have been made by Hector Fuentes who ran the mile in 4:39.5, and Sam Logan, who has high jumped 6 ft.

The squad has been increased by the addition of Joe Merka and "Acorn" Breazeale, high jumpers, and Ray Murray, quarter miler, this past week when they finished their basketball work.

The Aggie chances have been somewhat hurt by the injuries of Jack Kohler and Foy Cook, but according to coach Anderson, these boys will likely be ready for action before the first dual meet at Austin April 7.


