

AGGIE TANKMEN NOSE OUT SMU IN MEET HERE

Aggie Swimmers Defeat SMU Team by Close Score of 48-44. 300 Yard Medley Determining and Most Colorful Race of Meet.

In a close thrilling swimming meet, the outcome of which was not determined until the last race, the Texas Aggie tankmen won over the SMU natadors Saturday night by a score of 48-44. After both teams had been in the lead during the progress of the meet, the score before the last event of the night, the 300 yard medley race, was A and M 42, SMU 41. This left the entire meet to the outcome of the last race, the winner of which would get 6 points to 3 for the second.

Besides being the determining race in the meet, the 300 yard medley was probably the most interesting event in the entire meet. After taking up the second phase of the swim with the breast stroke nearly 40 feet behind his rival, W. S. Sinclair, Aggie holder of the conference record in the breast stroke retained this distance and took a ten foot lead in the 100 yards of breast stroke swimming. Tommy Uhr, Aggie dash swimmer from San Antonio, then took up the reins in the free style to add twelve more feet to win the race by a good 22 feet.

High point honors for individuals went to Chappell, speedy SMU distance swimmer, with 12 points and Knickerbocker, also of SMU, with 11 points.

In the 400 yard free style race, Chappell turned in the most outstanding individual performance by leading his closest opponent 150 feet and the next by 200 feet. Chappell started at a killing pace and instead of tiring maintained his rate for the entire race. Shortly after this he entered the 200 yard free style race and again resumed his pace to easily win first place in this event. The race for second place in this event was the closest of any in the meet with Reichardt, A and M, coming in only one stroke ahead of Curry, SMU.

Immediately after the swimming meet, the Texas Aggie Freshmen tangled with the A and M Varsity team in an exhibition water polo game that ended in a 2-2 deadlock. The Freshmen, coached by George Samuels and J. E. Moeller gave the Varsity players hard and fast competition and followed the ball so closely that every Varsity goal had to come from long chance shots.

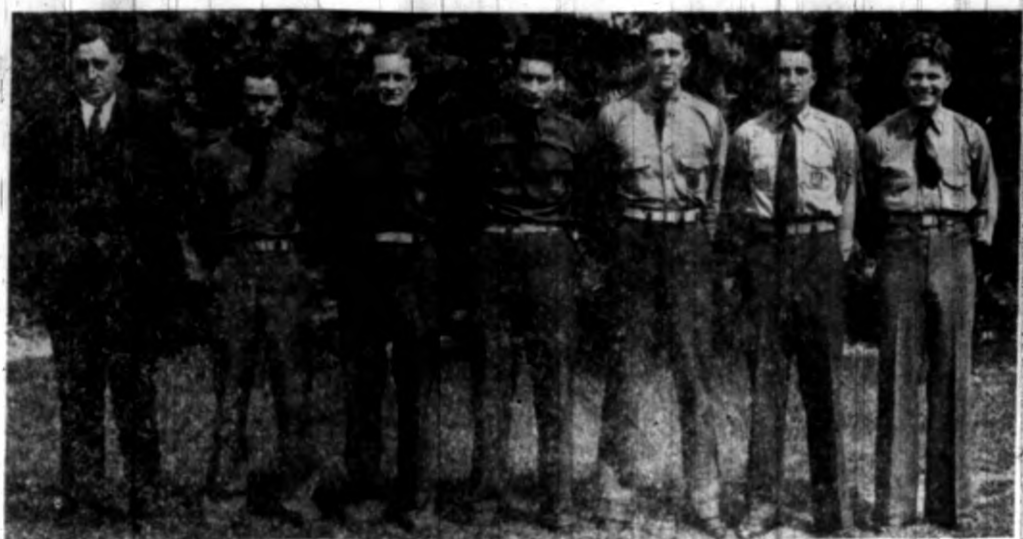

Although brilliant success has been the result of the firing in the National Intercollegiate Match, this match is being used as a preliminary for the Hearst Trophy Match, the firing for which is to be completed by April 3 or 4.

The team which is to represent A and M College in the Hearst Match stands among the best eight teams of the country. The team is composed of the following members: No. 1, C. P. Henley or L. R. Sayers; No. 2, R. Huffaker; No. 3, K. Tucker; No. 4, T. G. Guerdum; and No. 5, C. A. Tosch.

The results of last week's firing in intercollegiate matches were very encouraging, according to Lieutenant Reiersen, coach of the team. Out of the twenty-three matches fired, A and M lost only four and these were to schools possessing some of the best teams in the country. The total score amounted to 1891 with C. A. Tosch, captain, leading with a score of 382, the other members following him closely.

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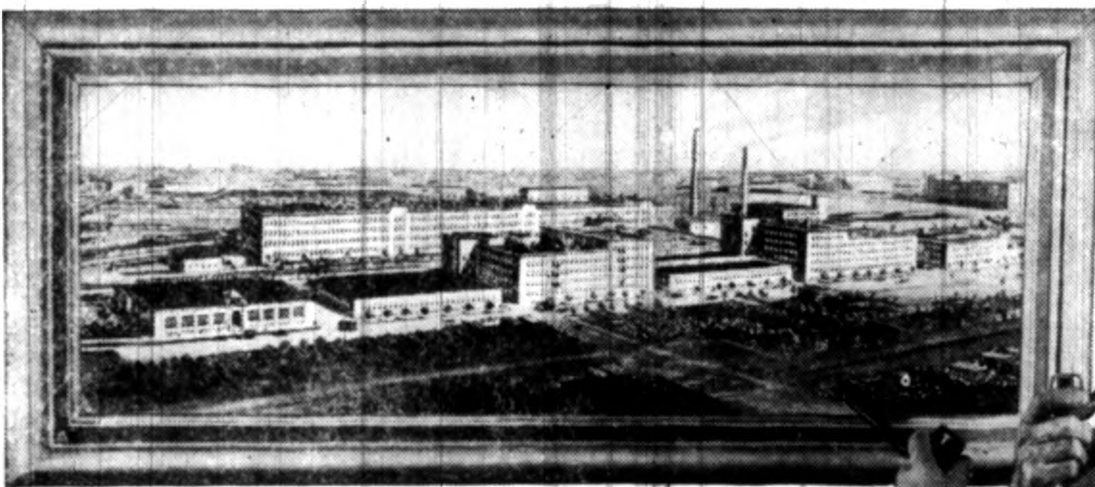
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
