# Aggies Capture Third Place at **Meet Saturday**

Irwin Breaks Own Record In Shot Put; Ties for First Place In Discus.

B. M. "Honk" Irwin, Kosse, brought back honors for the Aggie track team from the meet at the Fat Stock show in Fort Worth Saturday by capturing one first place and tying for another. In the shot put, Irwin, who already holds the conference record, bettered his old record by two-feet, four and onefourth inches. In the discus throw, W. M. Skripka, Rosenberg, tied with Irwin for first place to give the Aggies credit for first and second places in this event.

Wilbert Randow, Halletsville, was the only other Aggie who took a first place in the meet. Randow approached closely to Irwin's score by taking first in the 220yard low hurdles and placing second in the 120 yard high hurdles. In the low hurdles, Randow was followed closely by Herring, also of A and M.

In the prep-school division, the Texas Aggie freshmen won the relay race, and although the team had to pay its own way to the meet, brought back a bigger cup than the entire varsity team.


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

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
