

M E STUDENTS TO LEAVE MONDAY FOR TRIP TO HOUSTON

Three Days Will Be Spent In A Tour of Leading Industrial and Commercial Houses.

Thirty senior students of Mechanical Engineering and three professors in the department of Mechanical Engineering will drive to Houston Monday morning, April 16, for the purpose of making an inspection of industries and commercial houses in the vicinity of Port Houston.

The inspection trip is an annual affair for seniors in the department and is sponsored for the purpose of acquainting them, to at least a small degree, with the commercial aspects of the field they are about to enter.

Three days will be spent in the tour of the industrial establishments with a greater part of the time given over to a study of those with the most direct bearing on courses taken in the M E Department. Although the schedule of the tour is not now complete, tentative plans include visits to the following: Houston Lighting and Power Co.; Hughes Tool Co.; Reed Roller Bit Co.; The Ford Motor Co.; Texas Steel Warehouse, and the Municipal Elevator. Several boats in the harbor will also be visited, as well as the Port of Houston Fire Boat.

E E STUDENTS TO GO TO DALLAS ON INSPECTION TRIP

Approximately Fifty Seniors Will Make Trip; Plan To Leave For Dallas Sunday Afternoon.

Approximately fifty senior students of Electrical Engineering, accompanied by N. F. Rhode, C. C. Palmer and R. P. Ward, professors in the department of Electrical Engineering, will leave for Dallas Sunday afternoon, April 15, on the annual inspection trip, which is made each Spring by the class to be graduated, for the purpose of acquainting themselves with the commercial aspects of courses studied in the class room.

According to a tentative program announced by Mr. Rhode, the inspection of industries will be devoted largely to those with the most direct bearing upon the field of Electrical Engineering. Under this group are included: Dallas Power and Light, X-Ray equipment of the Kincheipe Company, Haskell Exchange of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., Graybar Electric Warehouse, General Electric Warehouse, and the Trinidad station of the D P & L. Several other industries which, although not directly related to E E, will prove interesting to the students, are to be visited. In this group the program lists Lone Star Cement Co., City Pumping Plant (Bachman Dam), Dallas Municipal Airport, Ford Motor Company Assembling Plant, Dallas Gas Co., and Times Herald Newspaper.

The group is to be entertained at breakfast and luncheon each day during their stay in Dallas by one of the firms which they visit that day, according to Mr. Rhode. Monday, they are to be guests of the D P & L for breakfast and The Lone Star Cement Co. for lunch. Tuesday, The General Electric Co. will entertain with breakfast and the Dallas Gas Co. with lunch. Wednesday will be spent with the Dallas Power and Light at their Trinidad Plant.

CHEMICAL ENGINEERS TO MAKE INSPECTION TOUR

Seniors in chemical engineering, accompanied by M. K. Thornton and F. F. Bishop of the chemistry department, will start their inspection trip from the Ben Milam Hotel in Houston Monday morning, April 16. A bus has been chartered for the trip and various companies will be visited in Houston, Beaumont, Texas City and Port Arthur.

Included in the entertainment to be given for those making the trip will be a smoker at Beaumont Monday night given by the A and M ex-students club of Beaumont.

Matty Bell, retiring Aggie grid mentor, returned Thursday to the A and M campus after a leave of absence of one month during which time he aided in spring football training at Southern Methodist University.

Bell, who ended a five year period as head of the physical education department of A and M this year, will go to S M U next year as varsity line coach and chief assistant to Ray Morrison.

Russell Addresses Scholarship Society

Daniel Russell, professor of rural sociology, delivered an address on "The Social Problems of Our Present-day Organization" before the Scholarship Honor Society in the Asbury Room of the library Tuesday evening.

Dr. Russell pointed out the fact that great advances have been made in the physical sciences in the past hundred years, while little has been accomplished in the field of social sciences. He stated however, that this is to be expected since the social sciences have never kept pace with the physical sciences. Stress was placed on the marriage and divorce problem, as well as the unemployment and crime problems. One of the most expedient means of eliminating these difficulties is to enact universal national laws to supplant varying and inadequate state legislation, according to Dr. Russell.

Aggie Fencers Lose To Dallas "Y" Team

Winning two, tying one, and losing three of their bouts, the Texas Aggie fencing team lost the meet held Saturday night in Memorial gymnasium to the Dallas Y M C A Foilers. This was the first meet held by the A and M team against outside competition since its organization last year.

M. G. Calvert, Eagle Lake, and K. H. Pier, Fort Worth were the two Aggie fencers who won their contests. Calvert won over O. Grunow, captain of the Y M C A team by a score of 2-1 and Pier won over Fuhrop by the same score. Other Aggies in the meet were: Captain Charles Van DePutte, lost to Silberger; F. A. Hubbard lost to Alcorn; E. S. Hunter tied with Williams; and D. R. Parker lost to Van Riel.

A return match will be held with the Dallas team in May and arrangements are being made for the team to fence with the Fort Worth "Y" team on the same trip.

Finney Places Own Art Work On Exhibition

Architectural Professor's Collection of Lithograph and Pencil Sketches and Drawings May Be Seen This Week.

C. J. Finney, associate professor of architectural design, has placed on exhibition in the architectural library on the fourth floor of the old Main Building a collection of his own lithograph and pencil drawings, water color sketches, and measured drawing of La Bahia Mission at Goliad, Texas.

Included in the display are colorful interpretations of such well known spots as the old Villa Maria Convent of Bryan, a roadside scene near Hearne, ruins of Baylor university at Old Independence, A and M campus construction scenes, as well as scenes sketched in Mexico and France. Of particular interest is the water color sketch of a scene from the artist's window at Fontainebleau where he received the diplome d'ecole des Beaux-Arts.
