AGGIES TO CLOSE HOME SEASON WITH HORNED FROG NINE

Aggies Out For Revenge Against Frogs Who Scored Only A and M Defeat.

Almost within grasping distance of a Southwest Conference baseball championship, the hustling Texas Aggies will close their home season Friday and Saturday in a two-game series with the Texas Christian Horned Frogs. The Frogs have been the only conference team to win a game from the Cadets this year, having blasted out a 14 to 11 victory in the second tilt of their series at Fort Worth.

They thus need only one more victory to cinch a tie for the championship and two to salt it away for the year. And if they do so, it will be the second time in their history as well as the second time since Roswell Higginbotham became their baseball coach that the Aggies have won a Southwest Conference diamond pennant.

Two ace hurlers probably oppose each other in the first tilt, as Jake Mooty, of the Aggies, and "Slim" Kinzy, of the Frogs, are slated for the first-game mound duty. Mooty has four conference victories to his credit this season, one over the Frogs. Kinzy, leading conference hurler the past week, tamed the University of Texas Longhorns at Austin the past Friday. Homer Martinez and Dan Harston probably will hurl for the Aggies and Frogs, respectively, the second game.
