

Juniors To Receive Summer Training At Several U. S. Camps

All juniors who have been enrolled in the advance course of Military Science in their respective units will entrain Saturday evening, June 2, for their respective summer R.O.T.C. Camps where they will spend the following six weeks applying the practical methods of warfare.

The largest R.O.T.C. camp will be at Camp Bullis, Texas at which the Field Artillery, Infantry, and Signal Corps units will be stationed. Camp Bullis will be under the command of Lt. Col. A. R. Emery. Lt. Col. S. R. Hopkins, Lt. J. V. Carroll and Lt. J. Binns will be in charge of the Field Artillery unit and Major B. F. Delamater Jr., Major D. R. Alfonsi and Capt. R. Orr will be in charge of the Infantry unit. Lt. P. L. Neal will have charge of the Signal Corps unit. Other officers to be stationed at Camp Bullis for the R. O. T. C. Camp will be Capt. Reports Good Inspection

An official report of the annual R O T C inspection held last week has not been issued from the Eighth Corps Area headquarters, but comments of the inspecting officers indicate that the cadet corps will maintain its rating of "excellent," according to Lieutenant Colonel A. R. Emery, professor of military science and tactics. Colonel Emery stated that in his opinion the inspection was even better than that of last year when the corps received a rating of excellent in every department.

In appreciation for the efforts of the students in making such a credible showing, no practical drill will be held this week. A report of the inspection will be issued from general headquarters within the next few weeks, Colonel Emery stated.

The Infantry will be the largest organization at Camp Bullis, having eighty-two juniors taking the advanced summer course. There will be sixty-three juniors out of the Field Artillery and fifteen from the Signal Corps taking the advanced course.

Lt. M. H. Marcus will be stationed at Fort Clark, Texas, with the Cavalry advanced students. There will be forty advanced students at the Fort Clark camp.

Lt. K. S. Anderson will go to Fort McIntosh with thirty-four advanced students out of the Engineer unit.

The Coast Artillery juniors will journey to Fort Barrancas at Pensacola, Florida where they will be at camp with advanced students from Georgia Tech, Alabama Polytech, and Mississippi A and M. Major W. C. Washington and Lt. J. E. Peterson will be stationed at Fort Barrancas for the summer camp period. This will be the last time that the advanced students in the Coast Artillery will have the opportunity to go to Fort Barrancas for R.O.T.C. as there will be a Coast Artillery camp established at Fort Crockett by next year and thereafter.

The advanced students in Chemical Warfare will travel to Edgewood Arsenal in Maryland for their summer camp. Last year the Chemical Warfare students were obliged to attend camp Ft. Sam Houston due to lack of funds for their transportation to Maryland.

SENIOR CLASS EXPERIENCES SUCCESSFUL YEAR

If I may take the privilege of speaking in behalf of the senior class, I wish to report as its secretary-treasurer that the senior class has experienced a successful year.

We started at the beginning of the session with \$653.10, the net income from the Junior Prom and Final Ball of last year. This fund was kept separate from that of the social secretaries and at the end of the year contained a balance of \$417.81.

Zeke Tipton, the social secretary, gave us a dance schedule that I do not think has ever been equalled. We had numerous good outside bands together with our two local orchestras that afforded music for most enjoyable dances. Besides giving us unequalled dances, he also made a larger net income than any previous secretary, having \$507.19 on hand at the close of the session even though a considerable loss was sustained on the Senior Prom.

The class voted to contribute the remaining funds toward the erection of a flag pole in front of the new Administration Building. The two combined funds amounted to \$925.00 at the close of the session. Of this, \$125.00 was given to the junior class so that the graduating seniors may attend the Junior Prom and Final Ball with no assessment. The remaining \$800.00 was placed in the care of Mr. F. W. Hensel for the erection of the pole. Since the class will have departed by the time the project is complete, L. O. Zapp has been chosen to represent it in accepting the work.

The class wishes to offer its thanks to Mr. F. W. Hensel, Mr. J. F. Casey, and Mr. Eio Urbanosky for the interest they have taken in the flag pole project and also for securing Mr. Villa, a noted sculptor, to do the work. Mr. Villa has worked for Mr. Gutzon Borglan, America's foremost sculptor, for fifteen years. He is considered by Mr. Borglan the best assistant he has ever had. The senior class is indeed fortunate to secure the services of such an able man. The complete pole will cost approximately \$2000.00 and Mr. Hensel of the landscape art department is furnishing the remainder.

I also want to extend thanks to members of the corps and all other corps dance patrons who gave us their support and made the project possible.

May the oncoming class be equally as fortunate.

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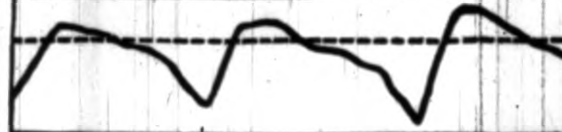
