I believe that the Aggies are good for two touchdowns over the Bears and that the Fighting Farmers can hold the Bruins to one touchdown with the passing defense they are working on this week. THE WILSON TRIO

It seems as though a southwest conference cross country team is not complete without a Wilson on it. This year Rice, Texas and A and M are the only three teams in the conference with cross country teams and each has a Wilson as their chief threat. On the Longhorn team is George Wilson, who won first place in the conference meet at Houston last year. He and two members of last year's team who finished with the first ten in the

conference meet are back on the 1934 team. At Rice Institute is "Rabbit" Wilson, who won second in the conference meet last year. Around him the Rice team will be formed. Then here at A and M we have a sophomore whose name is Wilson and who is also a cross country man. He seems to be the Aggies best bet this season as he has come out first in every competitive run the team has held so far. The meet seems to be a race of Wilsons this year.

The stands were not so well filled Saturday as only about 6,000 spectators witnessed the Aggie-Frog game, but up in the press box the attendance was somewhat larger than usual. There were sports writers from most every Southwest Conference city. Houston was unanimously represented with Lloyd Gregory, Post Sports Editor, Andy Anderson, Press Sports Editor, and Bert Freeman, Chronicle Sports Editor. The game was a heart-breaker

for Lloyd Gregory, always an Aggie friend, as he returned to Houston just \$10 poorer than he came up. After being kidded quite a bit about his predictions that the Aggies would win, Gregory bet Flem Hall, Star-Telegram Sports Editor, and Jinx Tucker \$5 each on the Aggies. Flem Hall says he is going to frame his five spot as it is the first bet he ever won from Gregory in his life. The Post Sports Editor is not uneasy for he plans on betting Hall \$10 on the Owl-Frog contest.

REMINISCENCES OF AGGIE ATHLETES



JOEL HUNT who was unable to make the Waco high school team, and turned down by his home college (Baylor), he came to A and M. After seeing very little service on the fish team, he played intramural football, got an invitation to the varsity, and became one of the greatest athletes ever turned out from Aggieland. After starting on an intramural team in the winter of 1925, Hunt was given an invitation to come out for spring training. The fall of 1925 he was a sophomore and proved to be one of the finds of the season, listed along with Gay, Arnold, Colgin, and Willis. He passed 12 yards to Wilson for the first touchdown of the season and beat S M U 7 to 0. His passing was brilliant through the season. The 1925-26 Longhorn carries an article about the Aggie back when he played against Baylor that year. "Aggie fans will long remember the Baylor game as Hunt's day. It was Hunt who was responsible for both touchdowns and it was Hunt

who continually slipped through the Bear defense or received the passes over their line. Scorned by the Baylor mentors in his high school days, it was Hunt who helped bring defeat to the Golden Bears."

Hunt made All-Southwest Conference halfback that year.

In the season of 1928 Hunt was shifted to quarterback. In this position he was again given an All-Conference berth. Hunt played a great game against the Sewanee team that year. He made the only touchdown scored against them and showed up well in all departments. He played a sensational game against T C U and made a 48 yard drop kick to start the scoring against the Frogs.

He was elected captain of the 1927 championship football team, was named All-Conference quarterback, All-American mention and All-Western halfback. In this year he led the Aggies to a 28 to 7 victory over the Texas Longhorns which meant a championship for A and M. It was a game of games at Aggieland—27,500 witnessed the game. Hunt passed to perfection at the crucial time.

After football season was over, he played for the All-West team that defeated the East team 16 to 6.

Hunt was also a star of the diamond. He was on the squad in 1927 and All-Southwest Conference shortstop in 1928. During the 1928 baseball season he was at bat 68 times and got 27 hits for an average of .397.

Since leaving A and M, Hunt played professional baseball three years in the Cardinal chain system and coached football one year at Marshall. In 1931 he came back to A and M as assistant backfield coach, then moved to Louisiana State where he has been assistant football coach since.

Baylor Should Be First Conference Victims of A&M

Baylor Will Enter Game as Slight Favorite Over A and M. Aggies Engaged in Intensive Practicing

The victory searching Aggies will invade the home playing field of the Baylor Golden Bears Saturday afternoon, October 27, when the Cadets go to Waco for the second conference tilt of the season. It will be a homecoming for the Bears. Both teams will be battling hard for their first conference win of the season. The Aggies dropped the first conference game of the season to T C U 13 to 0 while the Bears lost to Arkansas 6 to 0 in Little Rock, October 13. Baylor has a great passing team. It was their passing that was taking them down the field last year on Kyle field toward the last of the game. When the final gun had sounded, the Bears were near the Aggie pay station, and had made a list minute march from their own 40 yard line by slinging short passes just over the Aggie line. Their passing so far has been very effective. The Baylor club is rated next to S M U in this particular field,

and it was the passing of the Toads that dealt the Farmers plenty of misery. The running attack of the Bears should not give the Aggies so much trouble. The running backs of the Aggies such as Couser, Fowler, Cummings, and Thompson have the edge on the Jennings coached club.

Defensively the Bruins are strong. The line is big and experienced. They held the strong Arkansas team to a lone touchdown—and it came on a bad break. The previous week the Razorbacks had beaten the Texas Christians by a wide margin.

Baylor defeated Hardin-Simmons 13 to 6, and were defeated by the Texas Tech Matadors, but too much cannot be doped on these games, because even if some small school does defeat Baylor they are, nevertheless, a tough conference team.

The Aggies are working hard this week on a pass defense to stop the Bruins next Saturday. If the Aggies can stop the Bear aerial offense they are favorites to win the contest. The game is due to be one of the hardest fought contests of the season with the dope on the two teams pointing slightly in favor of Baylor.

FROGS WALLOP TEXAS AGGIES TO WIN 13-0

Many of the intramural boxers are out and a much better brand of boxing will be exhibited in future matches since all have a desire to learn the scientific side of boxing.

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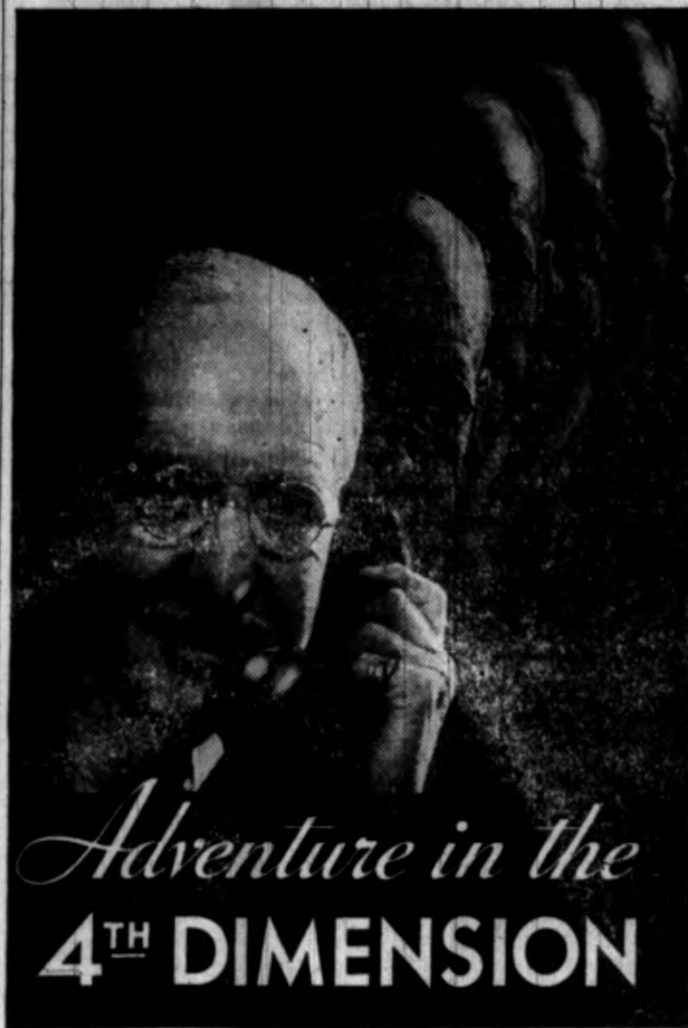
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
