Joe Routh, all-American guard in 1936 and 1937, for instance, is the son of an association member.

Quoted in the introduction to this issue is the following from the address by H. F. McGill, retiring president, at the association's convention in San Antonio this year:

"I know of no agency rendering more useful service to the business generally than the Texas A. and M. College. In every move for better methods of production, ranch improvement, for a more enlightened livestock and agricultural people through education, and a more economic and liberal social position, the college has shown a high quality of leadership.

"Its graduates and former students are numerous among cattlemen in this organization and they occupy positions of leadership among all organizations connected with agriculture in this state.

"When I think of the several hundred fine young men that this college sends back to the son each year with a scientific background, I know it will be only a short time when more cattle and better cattle will be raised in Texas on less acreage, and all beef type animals raised in Texas will be fed in Texas and on Texas feed."

In accepting the designation of the September issue as a special college number, President Walton of A. & M. said:

"Texas will never be able to discharge its debt of gratitude to the cattlemen of this State. . . I am sure that as a result of the review of the work of the College in 'The Cattleman,' there will come a new understanding of the

With only 2750 dormitory openings and 500 in the campus cooperative house, some 2450 Aggies will be forced to live off the campus this year, the greatest number ever forced to do so.

While it was announced last year that the college had hopes of completing one of the 12 contemplated new dormitories before registration this fall, work has not yet been started on the project, which has given rise to the housing problem.

The commandant's office, the Y. M. C. A., and the Brazos County Chamber of Commerce in Bryan have all been attempting to find rooms for students and are continuing to do so for the next few days.

Consensus of opinion is that with added housing facilities, enrollment might have passed the 6,000 mark, but even handicapped as the college is by lack of space, a total registration of 5,700 is expected in the next few days by Registrar E. J. Howell.
