Definitely good acting is turned in by Claire Trevor, who portrays the part of a tough girl. Her acting is jam up and is to be applauded loudly. Humphrey Bogart in his usual role, that of a gangster surpasses all other previous pictures and matches stride for stride the acting of the other two stars.
