

## A. & M. Will Be Well Represented At Kansas City Livestock Exposition

Texas A. & M. will be represented at the American Royal Livestock Exposition to be held in Kansas City, Mo., this Saturday by a livestock judging team composed of the following eight seniors, L. D. Buntin, E. S. Brown, E. R. Campbell, W. Camp, L. J. Christian, H. M. Mills, A. E. Prugel, and M. J. Smith. The team's coach is N. G. Schuessler, instructor in the Animal Husbandry Department, who will also be official judge of the beef cattle classes in the judging contest for students of vocational agriculture.

This team is practically the same one that won the senior college livestock judging contest at Fort Worth this spring. High hopes are held for their success this year.

### TEAM LEAVES WEDNESDAY

The team will leave here Wednesday morning, and will work out that afternoon in Dallas at the State Fair, taking part in the various events only for practice. However, Thursday afternoon they will practice again, this time at Oklahoma A. & M. College in Stillwater, Oklahoma. Then Saturday in Kansas City they will participate in the Senior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contest, in which sixteen colleges will be represented by teams.

A. & M. will be further represented in the Senior Intercollegiate Meat Judging Contest sponsored by the American Royal Livestock Exposition, by a team of four men. The meat judging contest will take place on next Tuesday. Our team will leave this Friday afternoon, will work out in the Armour and Co. meat-coolers in Fort Worth, and will then proceed to Kansas City, Missouri; it will return next Friday, a full week later.

Five men are now trying out for this team. These are S. C. Stribling, Bob Balch, C. C. Watterson, H. O. Citterer, and B. F. Itchner. Of these, four will be chosen to make the trip. C. E. Murphy, instructor in the Animal Husbandry Department, will accompany and coach them on the trip.

### SEVERAL COLLEGES REPRESENTED

The meat-judging contest is one for juniors and seniors in college. Nine or ten colleges of the Midwest will be represented. There will be three classes of meat to judge (beef, pork, and lamb), with four exhibits in each class. The contest will be held in the coolers of one of the nationally-known meat packing companies in Kansas City. Trophies will be awarded by the National Livestock and Meat Board.

This is the first time Texas A. & M. has ever sent a team to take part in this contest. Two of the men trying out for the team—Tribling and Itchner—were on the team sent to Fort Worth last year, where they won the meat-judging contest in the Southwest Livestock Exposition and Fat Stock Show.

### RIDES FAMOUS HORSE

According to Dean Marsteller, Head of the School of Veterinary Medicine, Cadet S. O. Callahan III of Amarillo, Texas, sophomore veterinary student in the Cavalry, will ride the famous horse "Lady

Joy" in the American Royal Livestock Exposition.

"Lady Joy" is a seven-year-old chestnut mare hunter, bred and raised in Amarillo and owned by Mrs. A. R. Anderson, Herring Hotel, Amarillo. Mrs. Anderson is a well-known equestrienne in the United States.

The mare has been trained and ridden by Callahan, who has shown her in horse shows at Amarillo, Lubbock, and Plainview. "Lady Joy" has never been defeated in any show she has been in.

## HORSES FROM A. & M. WILL BE SHOWN AT FAIR

Fifteen head of Percheron and American Saddle Horses will be exhibited by the Animal Husbandry Department at the Dallas State Fair this year. There will be ten Percheron and five saddle horses exhibited.

Among the horses will be Carcellus Jr., a Percheron stallion. Carcellus was third in his class at the International Livestock Show at Chicago. Also there will be the mare Josephine, who was exhibited in a great many shows three years ago, and won first place in a number of them.

This is the first Dallas fair that has been held for four years, due to the interruption by the Centennial. Most of the Percherons and all of the saddle horses have been bred and developed here at A. & M. College.

The difference that marks the picture is what the movie scenarists call a "story-point". Each musical number not only fits in logically at its appointed spot, but each one makes some definite contribution

to the picture. The only objections your reviewer has are those toward the "Yacht Club" babies. Their antics are becoming so tiresome that one actually wants to leave the moment they appear. On the whole, all should enjoy the picture and the music. Both Fred MacMurray and Harriet Hillard are at their best.
