CIRCULAR NO. 11

1. Reference is made to Paragraph 5 (f), Section II, College Regulations, 1938, which reads as follows:

"Except when otherwise specified, all students are authorized to wear civilian clothes after retreat when off the Campus. Communities adjacent to the Campus are considered as part of the Campus in so far as this privilege is concerned."

2. The above quoted regulation is being misinterpreted by some students as authorization to wear any type of "non-reg" clothing, after retreat anywhere off the Campus. In order that there may be no further misconception on the part of any one, civilian clothes is defined as "becoming civilian attire, including necktie."

3. With further reference to the regulation in question, "communities adjacent to the Campus", include College Park, Oakwood Addition, the business and residence district adjacent to the North Gate, the Country Club, Hrdlicka's, and any and all filling stations, residences, places of amusement, or places of business within 3 miles of the Academic Building.

One Aggie's Slant: All-Americans Numbered Three In Saturday Game

When Aggie Coach Homer Norton said the T. C. U. team was one of the best he had ever seen, he was not over-rating the Frogs at all.

T. C. U., which always has a team well up with the best, is really set to go to town this season. It's a bit early for picking the nation's outstanding teams, but there can be no question that Dutch Meyer's collection of grid talent has a slot in the super-elite bracket of anybody's calculation.

TODD OUTSTANDING

And so did all the players on both teams, barring some unfortunate but always-present muffs.

I don't want to apologize for the defeat of the Aggie team, but there are some points which should be considered.

IT'S OVER NOW

In the first place, the team returned from Frisco only Tuesday. The Frog squad got back from Philly a full day earlier, which gave a decided advantage to the Toads.

Secondly, the Frog team is composed of seniors almost entirely, who have had years of valuable experience in playing together. The Aggies aren't fortunate enough to have that situation to the extent the Frogs have it.

And the list could go on. But there's no need for it to.

Saturday's gone and all Aggies, I feel sure, will carry on the good tradition of forgetting it and aiming for the rest of the tilt.

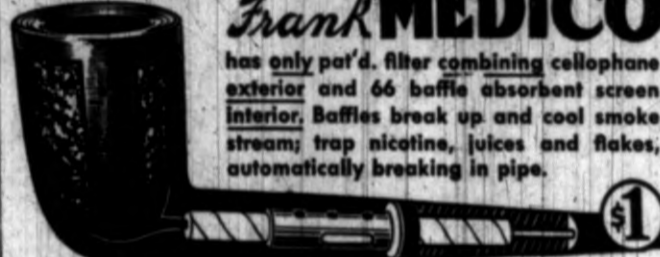
