(b) Except as prescribed in (a) above, students may wear the uniform pertaining to the year of attendance in College here or elsewhere, except that no fourth year man, unless he is a classified senior, nor a fifth year man, unless he is a cadet officer, will wear boots, breeches, or Sam Browne belt with strap.

6. CAP The wire will not be removed from the crown or bent in

any unusual shape.

7. SERVICE HAT. The service hat will be worn peaked, with four indentations.

2. Organization Commanders will be held responsible for enforcement of the above regulations and all cadet officers will make every effort to assist in correcting the existing conditions in regard to the improper wearing of the uniform.

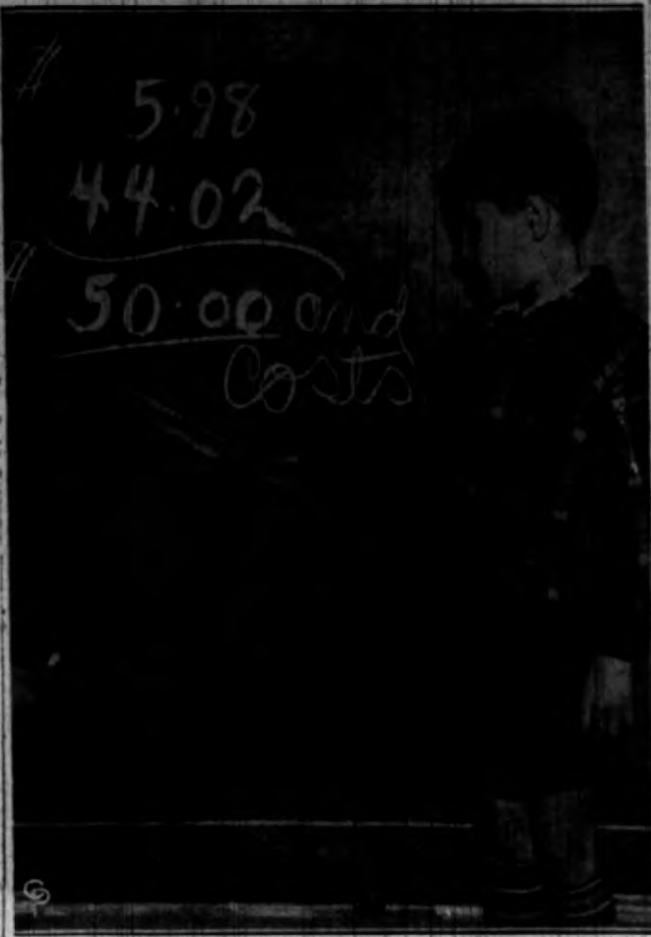

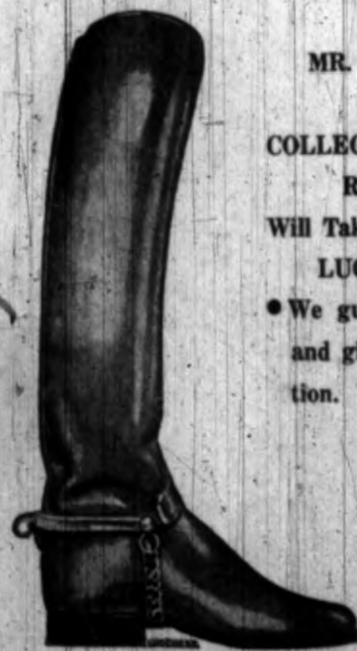
