No important changes will be made in the regular student labor workers until Dec. 1, when the mid-semester grades are posted. After Dec. 1 grades will be an important factor in obtaining work, and all students not passing 10 semester hours at that time will be forced to give up their jobs and will not be eligible for another one until they have successfully passed one semester of studies here.

Students are reminded that it will be necessary to fill out a Student Labor blank in order to obtain

Jobs on the dormitory work. However, wages will be paid by the Dallas Construction Company, and will probably be considerably higher than the regular 30¢ per hour paid by the college.
