APTITUDE TESTS TO BE GIVEN PRE MEDS DEC. 2

The Association of Medical Colleges will give their Pre-Medical Aptitude Test on Dec. 2. This is required to be taken by all Pre-Medical students the year before they enter Medical School.

The test is designed to furnish the scientific background, the general information, and the ability to draw accurate conclusions possessed by the student. The student is given a rating as to his standing as compared with the standings of the students of all American Colleges. This rating is used by the Medical Schools in considering a student's application for entrance.

An interesting sidelight on the test is that it is given at exactly the same date and hour all over the United States. It is given at 2 p. m. central time, 3 p. m. eastern time, and 1 p. m. mountain time, and so on.

Twenty-five men from A. & M. are expected to take the test this year. Last year there were twenty-six. Students are allowed to take the test only once each year, but they may take it several years. The only requirement is that it be taken the year before entrance into medical college.
