LIVESTOCK TEAM PLACES 17TH IN NATIONAL MEET

The Senior Livestock Judging Team of A. & M. won 17th place in the Annual Livestock Judging Contest which was held in Chicago Saturday, according to a wire received by the Animal Husbandry Department Monday. Iowa and Kansas tied for first place at the meetings.

There were 27 teams from all over the United States entered in the contests. The team from Texas was 91 points behind the top team.

Edwin Brown, one of the representatives from A. & M., was high man for the sheep division of the contest and was 10th in cattle judging. The team as a whole won 3rd in sheep and 9th in cattle judging.

The team left College Station Nov. 15 to be gone for 35 days. According to members of the Animal Husbandry Department, this is the most extensive trip ever made by the team.
