try. The Thornton Allen Music Publishing Company was investigated before I assigned the copyright," he said.
Written by Mr. Wilson while he was in the trenches in France,

"Aggie War Hymn"—better known as "Goodbye to Texas"—has been the school fight song since the close of the World War.
Mr. Wilson said that before he transferred the copyright, he had conferred with leaders at A. & M. and in the Former Students Association and they had all received the idea favorably.

Reports printed in newspapers over the state to the effect that The Battalion would sponsor a move for a new song to replace the "War Hymn" were absolutely without foundation, editors said today. No one on the staff of the newspaper gave permission to any reporter or anyone else to print such a statement, they disclosed.

Concerning the recent furor over the song's copyright transfer, Mr. Wilson said, "I'm sorry all this came up, but the Aggies seem to like the song very well, so I don't think it will hurt anything."

Recently new words to the "War Hymn" designed to be appropriate for all intercollegiate contests were written by Mr. Wilson. He said, "Texas is our biggest rival, but I realized the words I originally wrote don't apply to all the contests now. I hope the new ones will be adopted."
