Since he became swimming coach here, A. & M. has won one or two firsts and has always placed at least second in the Southwest conference meets. In the last couple of years A. & M. succeeded in starting, largely through the efforts of Coach Adamson, the all-state high school swimming and diving meet, held each May in the A. & M. pool, the P. L. Downs Natatorium.

Coach Adamson is a member of the National Intercollegiate Advisory Rules committee, the National A.A.U. Swimming committee, the Olympic Subcommittee on Water Polo, and is chairman of the Gulf A.A.U. Swimming committee.

Adamson has high hopes for his teams this year. "Bubba" Reeves, 1937 State high school diving champion, is now eligible as a member of the Aggie diving team and a number of other swimmers and divers and water poloist of good ability are working out every day.

with this idea in mind. In connection with this, it was brought to light that the college has owned a lot in the Bryan cemetery since sometime in the '30's, Two boys, evidently students, were buried there, one in 1889 and the other in 1893.

At the same time the body of

President Foster was being moved to make way for the new dormitories, plans were being made for possible vacating of old Foster Hall, which was named for him after its construction in 1899. Foster and Ross Halls may not be used next year if they are not badly needed, according to Dean Bolton.

At the time of the burial of President Foster, the college consisted of only a few buildings and some three or four dormitories, and it was thought that the campus would never extend as far out as the cemetery was placed.
