### PROBE CAVALIER DISASTER



This is the Curtiss-Hawk pursuit plane, with Pilot Lloyd Child at the controls, which traveled faster than any man has ever traveled before. Testing the plane at Buffalo, N. Y., for the French Government, Child free-power dived the heavily-armed craft at more than 575 miles an hour. France has purchased 100 of the planes . . . The beautiful Plaza Cataluna in the heart of Barcelona presents a much different picture today as the result of General Franco's insurgent troops who smashed their way through the city. Government forces barricaded themselves along the boulevards when they prepared for the last stand . . . George C. Pirie, air attache of the British Embassy, is shown in a New York hotel questioning Capt. M. L. Anderson (right) who was in charge of the flying boat Cavalier when it plunged into the Atlantic Ocean between New York and Bermuda. Pirie is in charge of the investigation into the disaster which claimed three lives.
