Walking Backwards into Marriage? That's Subject for Friday Lecture

You would not think of attempting anything so foolish as to walk backwards, blindfolded, off a stage or up a flight of stairs. Even in the most ordinary daily operations you require clear vision, understanding of the subject and knowledge of what lies ahead.

But in taking one of the most important steps of life—getting married—most people do something equivalent to walking backward with a blindfold on. In nine cases out of ten, people walk into marriage with a complete lack of preparation for this important step and with a deplorable lack of vision of what lies ahead.

So says Roy E. Dickerson, who is an authority on marriage and family life, and he will proceed to substantiate that viewpoint and explain what he can do to improve the situation, in our own lives. He will be here at A. & M. Friday and Saturday, Feb. 10 and 11. Friday night at 7 in the chemistry lecture room he will lecture to the general public on the subject "Walking Backwards into Marriage", the theme of which is described above.

In addition to this main lecture, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., Dickerson will speak twice on "When a Couple are Engaged," for Marriage and Family Relations course classes (Rural Sociology 315), Friday morning at 10:00 and Saturday at 11:00. And he may give another lecture for the public in the Assembly Hall, Saturday afternoon in connection with the show on the subject "Understanding yourself."

Dickerson uses the most modern and entertaining as well as educational methods in his lecturing. Frequently in his lectures he uses stereopticon slides and moving pictures.

Dickerson, whose home is in Kansas City, Missouri, was awarded his degree of Bachelor of Laws at the University of Denver, and of Master of Laws at George Washington University. He has studied under the internationally famous educator Dr. Fritz Kunkel in Berlin, Germany, and in the latter's American Seminars.

Dickerson has made a national reputation for himself as a psychologist, sociologist, educator, and lecturer. Of late years he has devoted much of his time to lecturing at American colleges and universities. He is educational consultant and a member of the general advisory council of the American Social Hygiene Association. He has served as consultant and lecturer at many conference and institutes, such as the National Hi-Y Congress, 1938; Christian Youth Conference of North America, 1936; Columbia University, Vanderbilt University, Central College, and many other organizations.

STUDENT AND PUBLIC OPINION RUN PARALLEL

AUSTIN, Texas, February 7—That the average American student's trend of thoughts run parallel to public opinion in at least one way is shown by a comparison of polls taken by the American Institute of Public Opinion and the Student Opinion Surveys of America. At the same time the Surveys have received their first test of accuracy.

During the period from December to January President Roosevelt's popularity increased, both scientific sampling organizations show, and their figures come within two-tenths of one per cent of each other. Increases shown by the polls are:

American Institute... 2.5 per cent
 Student Surveys... 2.7 per cent

The rise in the President's popularity, Dr. George Gallup explains, is due to his activities in world affairs during the time rather than more controversial domestic. Students have been found more in favor of the President than the general public. The comparison throws some light upon the accuracy of the Student Opinion Surveys, organized in December with the Battalion as one of the cooperating college newspapers.

Another check on the Surveys was made when two polls were taken on different months, using different groups of students, with the same question, "Would you like to see Roosevelt run for a third term?" The results:

December, yes... 27.2 per cent
 January, yes... 28.2 per cent

Although the closeness of the figures does not constitute a test of the cross-section of students being used, it does point out that the

size of the sample being interviewed has apparently reached "stability," or, is large enough.

Nearly three thousand students of all geographical sections, economic levels, ages, and other classifications, are personally interviewed for each poll, thus representing the opinions of the 1,300,000 American collegians. The Fortune poll, which predicted Roosevelt's reelection with almost perfect accuracy, finds it possible to interview only 4,500 persons with similar scientific methods to find the opinions of 75,000,000 adults.
