U. C. L. A. BEATS AGGIE DEBATERS

"Pump priming" by the Federal government raised the business level of the nation in 1937 to within two points of the peak 1929 level. So contended Roy Woolsey and Milton Kramer, members of the U. C. L. A. debate team that appeared here Tuesday night as a part of their tour through the South. Opposing them on the affirmative side were the Aggie debaters, Don Gabriel and Mayo Thompson, who declared that enormous governmental expenditures had not decreased unemployment rolls nor increased the purchasing power of the nation.

Formally stated, the question for debate read, "Resolved, that the Government should not spend public funds for the stimulation of business."

No judges were appointed for the debate, but as a matter of formality, a decision was reached by a vote of the audience. U. C. L. A. receiving a majority of raised hands.

The U. C. L. A. team arrived late after some delay in Austin, where they defeated a debate team from the University of Texas in an argument on the same question, though taking the opposite side. Also while in Austin, the U. C. L. A. boys heard President Walton and Deal Kyle speak before the Senate Appropriations committee of the Texas Legislature.

A. I. C. H. E. CHAPTER IS FORMED HERE

Members of the A. & M. Chemical Society were notified this week that their charter for a chapter of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers has been granted. The A. I. C. H. E. is a national professional society on somewhat the same order as the A.S.M.E.

There are three requirements that must be met before a chapter can be formed. These are that the Club be recommended to the Society by the head of the Chemical Engineering Department; that a faculty member and advisor be a member of the Society; and that the course of study be passed on by a committee of student chapters, appointed by the Society. Dean Gibb Gilchrist recommended the club to the Society; J. D. Lindsey is the faculty representative; and the course passed the committee's requirements satisfactorily.

Having a Chapter of the A.I.C.H.E. is expected to bring A. & M. added national recognition and to be of great help to the 190 boys who are members at this time. Any boy who is taking Chemical Engineering is eligible for membership, despite his grades or classification. The Chapter's program is to bring in as many prominent men in chemical engineering as possible during the year to give talks on the various phases in chemical engineering work over the state and country.

W. B. Franklin, of the Humble Oil and Refining Company at Baytown, will speak on "Chemical Engineering Problems to be found in Oil Refineries" at the Chapter's meeting Friday night at 7:30 in the Chemical Lecture Room.

Officers of the Chapter include Ed Hagan, President; A. T. Hingle, Vice President; and Bob Adams, Secretary-Treasurer.

Paul Ketelsen, Jr., who was ineligible last year, is back again. Two years ago he was second in diving in the S.W.A.A. Much is expected of him this season.

Other outstanding men on the squad are Bubba Reeves, diver; H. Hensley, Nick Ponthieux, George Japhet, Thomas Richey, Carl Hill, Homer Allen, Chick Denny, E. E. Aldridge, H. Webb, and Galt.

Fourteen freshmen have reported for the freshman team. Adamson wants more out, especially divers. They can get in touch with the coach at the pool between four and five-thirty, daily.

5,048 NOW ATTENDING SCHOOL HERE

parable to those of the agricultural research division. Emphasis upon chemistry and the processing of agricultural products point the way to recovery of economic balance in Texas, Dr. Walton and his associates feel.

Dr. Walton details organization of a planning committee to determine the fields in which A. & M. can best serve in the agricultural and industrial development of Texas. This committee was appointed following a conference between Governor W. Lee O'Daniel and F. M. Law, president of the A. & M. board of directors, during which the governor advised Mr. Law that he expected to lean upon the college for help and guidance in the development of his plans for industrialization of Texas.

The planning committee made an accurate survey of actual accomplishments of the various agencies and departments of A. & M. and fashioned a program of objectives for each division which it is believed can be accomplished. Two phases of industry largely are concerned, manufacture of natural resources and processing of agricultural products.

From the engineering agencies of the college it was recommended that investigation be made into the handicap placed on Texas by patent rights held in the north and east, and a survey of freight rates that penalize industry in this section. Development of chemical industries in Texas can be expedited by co-operation of A. & M. scientists. Public health as affected by engineering also can be referred to the State Health department. College technicians are available to assist in evaluating raw materials and minerals to determine their suitability for industrial development.
