A. & M. TEAM IN SOUTHWEST MEET

Texas A. & M. is being represented by a team in the annual Southwest College Debate Tournament at Austin today and tomorrow. Members of the A. & M. team are R. L. Doss, Mayo Thompson, Don Gabriel, and J. L. Nichols.

Invitations from the University of Texas to take part in this tournament have been accepted by six of the largest colleges and universities of the Southwest. These include T. C. U., Baylor, the University of Kansas, Louisiana State University, Oklahoma University, and Texas A. & M. Teams from other institutions will compete for the Southwest title.

The question for debate is, "Resolved, That the State of Texas should adopt a uniform retail sales tax." This question is one of vital interest to all Texans at this time, because of the possibility of the adoption of such a tax by the State Legislature.

\$15 Prize Offered For Best Aggie Play

A fifteen dollar prize will be given for the best play written by an A. & M. student for use as the annual Aggie stage production, according to an announcement made yesterday by R. L. Elkins, business manager of the Aggie Play Committee.

The annual stage production which has been held for the last four years has proved an outstanding success in the past, and in an effort to make this year's production an even greater success the play committee, headed by Dr. T. F. Mayo and C. O. Spriggs, has decided to make it a 100% Aggie play by staging a play-writing contest for the purpose of obtaining the best manuscript available. If a satisfactory play can be found, it will be presented by actors selected from the campus before the student body during the latter part of April.

The play must be typewritten, of at least one and a half hours length, and must have its scenes laid on the campus with a plot having to do with A. & M. life. A three-hour play is preferred. The title and characters may be of the author's own choosing, but the scene must be laid during the present time. All manuscripts are to be turned in to Dr. Mayo and any more detailed information desired by prospective playwrights can be obtained from him.

In the past it has been the custom for the play to be written by a selected individual, with some outstanding hits being written by Dr. Mayo and Tom Brown. However, a different procedure has been decided upon for this year by the committee. Much interest has already been taken in the contest and all prospective writers are urged by Dr. Mayo to get in touch with him or one of the other members of the committee immediately.

W. LEE O' ASKS CHANGES IN STATE BOOK-KEEPING

Abolition of the A. & M. available fund, along with a similar fund for the University of Texas and the state textbook fund, was advocated Tuesday by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel in a message to the members of the Forty-sixth legislature urging the consolidation of the 55 special state funds.

Although the governor stated in his message that it seemed to him that a bill could be enacted which would eliminate the funds, critics believed that a vote of the Texas electorate would be required.

The A. & M. and University funds represent income from investments of the permanent funds of those institutions, and were set up by the constitution. The text fund is derived from a special ad valorem tax, with a current balance of \$299,581. It is used to buy free school books for Texas schools.

BAYLOR UNIVERSITY WILL sponsor and host the initial Texas Intercollegiate Dramatic Festival March 23 to 25, it was announced by Prof. J. Clark Weaver of the speech department, general chairman of the meet.

The festival, first of its kind ever held in Texas or the Southwest, will be the presentation of one act plays by Texas college and university students. No prizes will be awarded, but each presentation will be criticized publicly so as to aid the students in bettering their weak points.
