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Aggies Drop First Baseball Games To Grand Prize Team, 13-9 and 9-5

Marty Karow's Aggies dropped a brace of games to the visiting Grand Prize Brewers from Houston Friday and Saturday by scores of 13 to 9 and 9 to 5 respectively.

The Cadets' big weakness was in their pitching staff, which has heretofore been considered their stronghold.

In the first fray the Aggie twirlers could not find the plate. In the second fray after Sam Bass left the mound, the moundsmen could not find the plate with their stuff on the ball, and when they sacrificed their speed and hooks for control, the Brewers slapped the ball all over the park and even out of it.

Friday, Ralph Lindsey and Don Peden were the best of the lot and Saturday it was Bass and Polanovich who were able to hold the foe down.

FRIDAY GAME

Lefty Cohn started for the Aggies. He allowed three runs in the first and one in the second before he was relieved by Lindsey after one was down in the second. Lindsey pitched shut-out ball for the next three and two-thirds innings.

He was replaced by Polanovich who pitched to four men. He walked two, hit one, and got the other out. Hal Welsh replaced him and struck out one, walked four and threw three wild pitches as well as allowing two hits. Peden finished the game and held the visitors at bay during his two and two-thirds innings.

The Aggies scored three in the fourth, three in the seventh, two in the eighth and one in the ninth. The Brewers scored three in the first, one in the second, six in the fifth, and three in the seventh.

Heinie Schuble, former Detroit shortstop, homered over the 25 foot wall in center field for three runs in the first inning. Dave Alsbrook homered late in the game with one man on base.

SATURDAY GAME

The game opened with Walter Bass on the mound for the Cadets—broken left hand and all. The first man up singled, but Bass showed his Scotch blood and bore down. AGGIE TRACK MEN WIN OVER SAN MARCOS TEAM

Ed Dreiss and Red Cecil racked up 31 1/4 points between them at San Marcos Friday as the Aggies beat the San Marcos Teachers, 89 to 38, in a dual track meet.

Dreiss took both the high and low hurdles in 15:5 and 25:1, was second in the pole vault and tied for first with Haese of the Teachers at 6 feet 1 1/4 inches in the high jump.

Cecil grabbed the 100 in 9.9, the broad jump at 21 feet, was second to Ralph Moser in the 220 in 21.9 and ran a lap on the winning sprint relay team with Todd, Moser and Kissingner.

Moser made 12 1/2 points and won the 440 in 50.8. Mickey Hogan won the mile in 4:40.4, while Storms took the 880 in 2:04.7. The Aggie mile relay team was tops in 3:27.4.

Annual federal inspection of the college by the officers of the Eighth Corps Area will be made May 2 and 3, according to Col. Geo. F. Moore, P. M. S. & T. and Commandant.

AGGIE WATER POLOISTS WIN FROM TEXAS U.

Saturday night the Aggie water poloists trimmed the Texas U. aggregation 6 to 3 while the Texas swimming team won the swimming meet 47 to 27.

Adolph Kiefer, Texas national ranking swimmer, took two matches for the only double. He won the 220 in the record breaking time of 2:18.2 compared to the conference mark of 2:30.3. He was clocked at 5:04.5 in the 440.

John Crouch was the only Aggie to win a first in the swimming meet. He trimmed Bill Morris, Texas, in the 50 yard sprint. All other Aggie points were gleaned from seconds and thirds.

In the polo game, the Aggies played against coaches, freshmen and varsity swimmers, and divers. The Steers were trimmed largely due to their inexperience.

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
