Reserve Officers Plan Cruise for 1939 Convention

It's always a sign of big doings when the army goes to sea and this time is no exception. Reserve Officers Association will hold its 1939 national convention in Porto Rico.

An entertainment program ashore and afloat has been arranged that should keep all participants busy from morn till night, and the convention, as a whole, will probably be the finest ever from every standpoint; it's a West Indies cruise that will include ship fun and shore thrills, and at the same time will prove quite expedient in so far as business is concerned. The convention will be close, intimate, economical, and above all, it will be different and unusual.

The floating convention will leave New York via the Iroquois, a favorite cruise line, on Saturday, June 17, and after it has put out to sea, all members will register and then settle down to the task of having fun during the three days while en route to Porto Rico. The Iroquois will dock on the morning of the 20th, and the U. S. representatives will be given a warm reception by the Porto Rico Department of the Association, which will be followed by three days of official business combined with a lot of pleasure.

At 2 a. m. on June 24 farewells will be said, and the "conventioners" will sail for the United States by way of St. Thomas Island where they will stop off for nine hours of exploration and will then continue their journey homeward.
