

# Two Sophomores File for Junior Yell Leader Positions

## Sedberry and Keeton Submit Signed Petitions

Two sophomores had turned in petitions to be considered for Junior Yell Leader to Sophomore President Jack Bailey last night. Jim Sedberry, Field Artillery and Earnest R. "Buster" Keeton, Signal Corps, are the two candidates. Sedberry was the first man to turn in his petition, signed by 100 sophomores and juniors in accordance with election rules.

The Junior Yell Leaders will be chosen after two votes, one by the sophomore class to select six men capable of handling the job and the second, final vote by a joint sophomore-junior meeting. The sophomore class meeting will be held April 17, with April 15 the last day to turn in petitions.

It is reported that there will be many more candidates for the two positions to announce before the conclusion of the filing period.

Sedberry, who was on the freshman football squad last year, is from Beaumont, although he was graduated from Waco High School after being mentioned on All-State basketball selections.

Keeton lives in Houston and is a graduate of Milby Senior High School there.

The two men elected Junior Yell Leaders will be the only candidates for Chief Yell Leader next year.

## COMMENCEMENT DAY SET FOR CLASS REUNIONS

Commencement this year will gather some of the largest class reunions in the history of the school with the classes of 1899, 1904, 1909, 1914, and 1929 taking part, according to announcements made this week by the Association of Former Students.

Programs for the class reunions have not as yet been announced by the committees from the various classes but tentative plans call for a two day reunion of the five classes on June 2-3 with members from more than a dozen states being present.

Oldest class to have a reunion this year will be the class of 1899 which will celebrate its 40th anniversary; plans for which are being handled by Dean E. J. Kyle, one of the leading members of that class. Included in the plans for the class reunions will be prizes to be given to the members who come the longest distance to commencement.

The most interest to date has been shown by the class of 1909 which is headed by Major David M. Shearer of Seattle, Washington, according to the ex-students' office, which stated that early interest indicates that this class will turn out almost 100% for the reunion.
