Teams to Play Again Today

With the Texas players rattling the boards for 21 hits that were good for 31 bases, Uncle Billy Disch tramped the Aggies for the second time of the year by a score of 18 to 3.

The two teams meet again today at 4 o'clock.

In the first frame the Steers jumped Lefty Cohn for three-hits and two runs. Haas popped out to third, but Moers doubled to center. Pfeil singled past third sending Moers to third from where he scored on a passed ball. Evans rolled out second to first. Conway scored Pfeil with a double. Hill rolled out.

The Aggies failed to tally as the first three hitters went down in order.

Texas added another in the second. With one down Everett walked and went to second on Deutsch' single. Hall flew out, but Moers singled to score Everett.

With one down Williams doubled and scored on Cooper's single. Doran ended the frame by rolling out to the pitcher.

Evans led off with a double in the third and scored on Hill's single. Lawson hit into a double play. Peden relieved Cohn on the hill for the Aggies after Hill's hit.

The Aggies failed to scratch in their half.

In the fourth with two on, after Deutsch had scored, Evans put one out of the park. Alsbrook singled in his half for the only Cadet threat.

The fifth saw Texas go hitless for the first time.

The sixth did not find any hits by either team, but in the seventh Texas gleaned eight hits and eight runs when twelve men faced Peden and Polanovich. Evans was safe on an error. Conway singled after Evans had been caught stealing. Hill walked and Conway went to second. Lawson doubled to score Conway. Everett singled. Deutsch singled and Lawson came home after Hill had scored. Haas singled to right and Everett scored. Moers whiffed. Pfeil doubled and then Evans doubled. Conway doubled and then Hill rolled out.

The Cadets picked up two in the eighth. Nolen singled through short. Jeffrey popped out. Stone singled. Alsbrook scored Nolen with a double. Stone scored when Williams went out. Texas had tallied one in her half of the frame.

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Rice Owls Walk Off With Top Honors From Southwest Track and Field Meet

Led by "Flying Freddie" Wolcott, the Rice Owls ran true to form and walked off with the twenty-fifth annual Southwest Conference track and field meet Saturday afternoon here. Wolcott was high man in the meet with 15½ points.

Two records fell during the meet. Wolcott set a new record of 9.5 in the 100 yard dash in the prelims Friday. Doc O'Neill of the S. M. U. bettered his record of 208 feet in the javelin throw. His mark was 216 feet 8½ inches Saturday. Graham of Texas also beat the old conference mark with a heave of 212 feet 5 inches.

The expected duel between Rice and Texas failed to show up. Rice won with 56 points; Texas 45½; A. & M. 36; S. M. U. 16; Arkansas 8½; A. & M. 36; S. M. U. 14; Arkansas 8½; and T. C. U. 6½.

Jim Thomason tossed the shot 49 feet, 5¼ inches. It was the best toss of his life and came at a time when it was needed for first place. Texas was disqualified in the 880. Their man won the race, but it went for naught and hurt the Steers chances.

Strother and Hogan ran one, two in the two mile run for the Aggies and both finished with comfortable leads.

RICE GOLFERS TAKE SOUTHWEST CONFERENCE TOPS

The Rice Owls nosed out the Texas Longhorn golfers by six points Friday to carry off the Southwest Conference title on the Brae Burn course in Houston.

This is the first time in the history of the four man competition that the title has gone to any school other than Texas. The Rice linksmen totaled a score of 1224 to the University's 1230.

Ed Letscher of Rice carried off the individual honors over Rufus King, defending champion of S. M. U., by a margin of 17 points. Buck Luce, Texas, and Harry Crisman, Rice, were pre-tournament favorites but finished tied in the fourth berth. Leading the Aggie team was husky Henry Hauser who finished in fifth place with Spitzer and Taylor, both of Texas.

Team competition was first held in the conference in 1932 with the Texas teams capturing the honors through 1938. Before this only individual play was held.

The Arkansas legislature has passed a law requiring all of the state's higher educational institutions to teach nature study and conservation.

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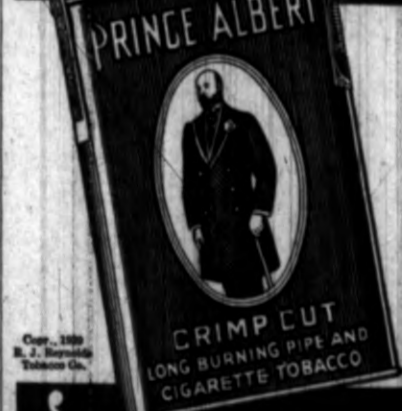
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
