AG ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT TO SPONSOR TOUR

The second annual summer tour course of the Department of Agricultural Economics involving 6,000 miles of travel in 20 states and two countries, will be conducted from July 17th to August 27th, according to J. Wheeler Barger, Head of the Department.

Professor L. S. Paines will be in charge of the tour this summer and will take a group on a tour through the southern and eastern states and return by way of Canada and the middle west. Problems of land use and the economic aspects of production will be observed in the regions visited, and special emphasis will be given to agricultural marketing operations in the large consuming centers.

Opportunity will also be given for attending the World's Fair in New York and visiting numerous places of historic interest. The group will spend some time with officials of the Tennessee Valley Authority at Knoxville, Tennessee, and with officials of the United States Department of Agriculture and Commerce in Washington.

The course carries six hours of college credit. All expenses on the trip, including transportation, meals and lodging, will amount to \$187.50 for the six weeks period.

Legal Notice

Mosquito Control Ordinance and Regulations

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of College Station, Texas:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful to have, keep, maintain, cause or permit within the incorporated limits of College Station, any collection of standing or flowing water in which mosquitoes breed or are likely to breed, unless such collection of water is treated so as effectually to prevent such breeding.

Sec. 2. Any collection of water considered by Sec. 1 of this ordinance shall be held to be those contained in ditches, pools, ponds, excavations, holes, depressions, open cesspools, privy vaults, fountains, cisterns, tanks, shallow wells, barrels, troughs, (except horse troughs in frequent use), urns, cans, boxes, bottles, tubs, buckets, defective house roof gutters, tanks of flush closets, or other similar water containers.

Sec. 3. The method of treatment of any collection of water, such as specified in Sec. 2, directed toward the prevention of breeding of mosquitoes shall be approved by the City Sanitary Engineer or his deputy and may be any one or more of the following:

a. Screening with wire netting of at least 16 meshes to the inch each way or with any other material which will effectually prevent the ingress or egress of mosquitoes.

Saturday morning, June 3, Col. George D. Sears, 36th Div., Texas National Guard, will present commissions as second lieutenants, Officers Reserve Corps, to members of the class who have completed their advanced courses in military science and tactics. Graduates receiving degrees as doctors of veterinary medicine will receive commissions as first lieutenants.

Immediately following presentation of commissions, final review of the A. & M. Cadet corps will be held. This officially closes the school year.

Other commencement features will include the final band concert by the Texas Aggie band Thursday afternoon. The Junior Prom will be held Thursday night and the final ball Friday night.

Complete emptying every seven (7) days of unscreened containers together with their thorough drying or cleaning. c. Using a larvicide approved and applied under the direction of the City Sanitary Engineer or his deputy. d. Covering completely the surface of the water with kerosene, petroleum, or paraffin oil once every 7 days. e. Cleaning and keeping sufficiently free of vegetable growth and other obstructions, and stocking with mosquito-destroying fish. f. Filling or draining to the satisfaction of the City Sanitary Engineer or his deputy. g. Proper disposal, by removal or destruction, of tin cans, tin boxes broken or empty bottles, and similar articles likely to hold water.

Sec. 4. The natural presence of mosquito larvae in standing or running water shall be evidence that mosquitoes are breeding there, and failure to prevent such breeding within three days after notice by the City Sanitary Engineer or his deputy, shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance.

Sec. 5. Should the person or persons, firm, or corporation responsible for conditions giving rise to the breeding of mosquitoes fail or refuse to take necessary measures to prevent the same, within 3 days after due notice has been given to them by letter, the City Sanitary Engineer or his deputy is hereby authorized to do so, and all necessary cost incurred by him for this purpose shall be a charge against the property owner or other person offending as the case may be.

Sec. 6. For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, the City Sanitary Engineer or his deputy, acting under his authority may at all reasonable times enter in and upon any premises within the City.

Sec. 7. Should any person or persons, firms or corporations within three days after due notice has been given by the City Sanitary Engineer or his deputy as to the existence of mosquito breeding places fail or refuse to take necessary measures to abate such nuisances, said person, firm, or corporation shall be guilty of violation of this ordinance, and shall be fined not more than \$25.00. Each day such violation continues shall be deemed a separate offense.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall become effective after its approval and due publication in the official paper.

Passed, approved and ordered published this 18th day of May 1939.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of College Station, Texas:

Section 1. No person, association, or corporation shall, on and after May 15, 1939, engage in furnishing water, light, power, gas, telephone, or sewerage service to the public within the limits of the City nor use the highways, streets or alleys within the city in connection with furnishing any of the aforesaid utilities services, unless said person, association or corporation shall have obtained and thereafter keeps in full force and effect a franchise to do so.

Section 2. Any agency desiring to furnish any of the utilities services referred to in Section 1 of this ordinance, or to use the highways, streets or alleys within the city in connection with the furnishing of such services, shall make and file with the City Secretary a written application, showing the name and address of the applicant for the franchise, the name and address of the person making the application, the kind or kinds of utilities services to be furnished, the area within the city to be served; and the names and addresses of the persons or the officers of the corporation upon whom legal service may be made. Said application shall be accompanied by a fee of \$3 which sum shall be used by the City to cover the expenses of carrying out this ordinance.

Section 4. When an application for a franchise has been filed, the mayor shall order a hearing on the application, notice of said hearing shall be given by publication in one issue of the official city paper. Upon favorable action by the city council, the City Secretary shall issue the franchise.

Section 5. Any person, association or corporation which in violation of this
