## MEMORANDUM NO. 34:

1. The Final Review of the entire Corps of Cadets dismounted, under arms, will be held Saturday, June 3, 1939:

First Call, 9:20 a. m.  
Assembly, 9:25 a. m.  
Adjutant's Call, 9:30 a. m.

Colors and guidons will be carried.

Cadet officers will wear sabers. Uniform: Number 1, with white shirts. (Cadet officers may wear boots.)

2. Formation: All units in line of

battalions, close column of platoons.

All units on north side of review field.

(3) (4) Order of units in line:

(1) Band (entire)

(2) Infantry Regiment—1st Battalion, 2d Battalion, 3d Battalion.

(3) Field Artillery Regiment—Regimental Units, 1st Battalion, 2d Battalion.

(4) Composite Regiment—Chemical Warfare Battalion, Signal Corps Battalion.

(5) Cavalry Regiment—1st Squadron, 2d Squadron.

(6) Engineer Regiment—1st Battalion, 2d Battalion.

(7) Coast Artillery Regiment—1st Battalion, 2d Battalion.

(b) Prior to Adjutant's Call, each cadet battalion adjutant will take post on the review field on the stake designating the right of his battalion for the purpose of guiding the battalion to its proper place in line.

4. (a) The Corps will pass in review twice, the first time under the command of the cadet officers, and the second time under the command of the senior cadet noncommissioned officer present with each organization.

(b) In passing in review, regiments will follow preceding regiments at 30 yards.

(c) After passing in review the first time, each regiment will return to its original place in line.

(d) When the Corps has been formed in line the second time, the corps commander will command:

(1) OFFICERS (2) FRONT (3) MARCH. At the command MARCH, cadet officers will form in front of their respective battalions on the line of regimental commanders facing to the front.

(e) The corps commander will then command: (1) OFFICERS, (2) CENTER, (3) MARCH. At the command MARCH, cadet officers will close in to the center of the line and will face to the front and dress towards the center without command.

(f) The officers will then be marched forward, halted 10 paces from the reviewing officers and presented to them by the Corps Commander. The Corps Commander will then command: (1) OFFICERS, (2) FORWARD, (3) MARCH, and will halt the cadet officers on the right and left of the reviewing stand.

(g) The Corps will then be presented to the graduating member of the Corps. The Corps Commander will return the salute. The band will play "The Spirit of Aggieland" and at the completion of the music the Corps will be brought to order arms.

5. The Corps will then pass in review under the command of the senior cadet noncommissioned of-

ficer present with each organization.

6. First sergeants will submit a report of the names of all absentees from the review formation to the Commandant's office prior to departure.

At the conclusion of Mr. Utay's talk a bronze plaque, honoring Mr. Kiest and naming the building the Edwin J. Kiest Hall, was unveiled.

Mr. Kiest, now nearing his 78th birthday, was entirely unaware of the honor that was to be paid him when he arrived at College Station Thursday afternoon. He was under the impression that the only purpose of his visit was to attend the regular meeting of the Board of Directors.

On the speakers' stand were eight of the members of the Board of Directors including Board Chairman F. M. Law, Houston; R. W. Briggs, Pharr; Walter G. Lacy, Waco; Joe Utay, Dallas; Henry C. Schuhmacher, Houston; G. R. White, Brady; O. H. Demke, Stephenville; and Mr. Kiest. Also on the speakers' stand were President T. O. Walton, E. E. McQuillen, and Cadet C. J. Wimer.

1600 STUDENTS EXPECTED 1ST SUMMER SESSION

Summer school will officially open Tuesday when an expected 1600 students will begin registration at 8 a. m. Dean C. H. Winkler will serve as director of the summer session, and all official business will be carried on through that office.

Classes will begin Tuesday afternoon at 1 p. m. Friday is the last day of registration for credit during the first term.

Three halls will be opened for the students. They are Leggett, Mitchell, and Milner. Walton will be opened to girls and married couples. Foster hall will be open this week-end for boys who intend to stay for summer school.

Expenses for the first session will include \$12.50 for the matriculation fee, \$2.00 for medical fee, and \$8.50 for room rent and janitor service. Meals, if eaten in the mess hall, will cost \$27.00 for the six weeks period.

Requirements for admission will be the same as in the regular session. Additional information which regards summer school may be obtained in the summer school catalogue at the registrar's office.
