Registration for the summer session's first semester totals 1,357, Registrar E. J. Howell, has announced. Of this number 89 are women.

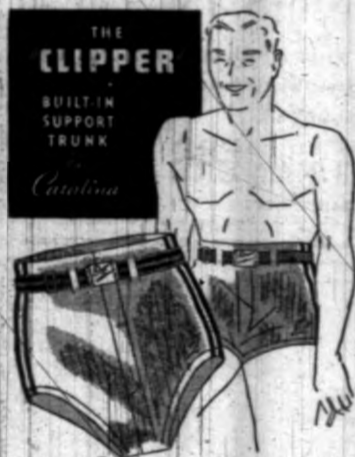
