**A. & M.'s Popular President, T. O. Walton, Is Outstanding American**

In Aggieland, where the democratic spirit prevails and the stuffy rules of formality are cut in half, even the highest official has his familiar nickname. The authorized edition of the Aggieland Dictionary of Popular Slang defines President T. O. Walton in the simple manner of "Prexy."

Thomas Otto Walton was born in Gary, Texas, March 8, 1883. As a youngster he spent his days on a typical Texas farm—an experience which laid the foundation for his later becoming president of an agricultural institution. He attended the public schools of Carthage and was graduated from North Texas State Teachers College. In 1926 Baylor University bestowed upon him the honorary degree of L.I.D.

The first six years following his graduation from college Dr. Walton spent teaching school in Panola County. In 1908 he went into extension work and served as county agent of Polk County for two years. In 1911 he was promoted to district agent, and in 1916 was made Director of the Agricultural Extension Service at A. & M. In 1925, by virtue of his assuming the presidency of Texas A. & M. College, he inherited his nickname "Prexy."

In addition to his local academic and administrative responsibilities Dr. Walton has served as President of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities, as member of the Texas Academy of Science, Texas State Teachers Association, American Agronomy Society, American Political Science Association, and Epsilon Sigma Phi fraternity. He is also a Democrat, a Baptist, and a Mason.

The Walton family is a true all-American one. Two sons and two daughters composed the original circle. In recent years this has broadened out to include an ex-Ag-

gie football star, an ex-Aggie Cadet Colonel, two charming daughters-in-law, and four grandchildren (a future Aggie hero and three future Aggie belles!)

Undoubtedly the President of Texas A. & M. possesses executive ability. His influence as a speaker has spread widely. It is, however, his wonderful personality, his magnetic smile, and his typical informal "Aggie" spirit that causes one to overhear on the campus, "Prexy?—Oh, he's a swell guy!"

sessions on two days of the conference.

Prof. E. L. Williams, head of the Industrial Education Department at A. & M., will lead the two sessions devoted to discussion of "Cooperating with Industry in Industrial Education" with the assistance of a panel composed of Superintendents R. H. Brister, of Waco; F. C. McConnell, of Glade-water; J. R. Eddy, director and Paschal Buckner, supervisor of industrial education, State Department of Education, of Austin. Prof. Williams also will lead the discussion of "Administration of Safety Education."

Supt. W. M. Green of Fort Worth will lead a discussion of "Procedures in the Administration of the Teaching Staff," and Dean Brooks will lead discussion of "Current Ef-

forts at Shaping National Educational Policies."

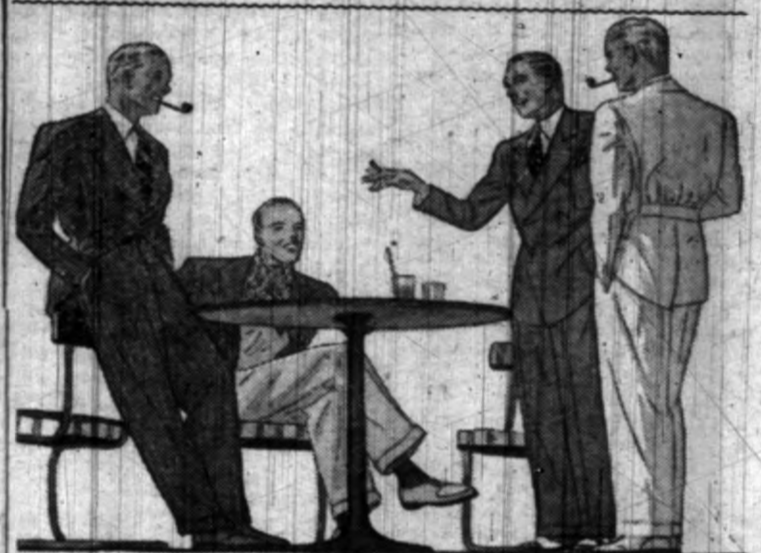
