

## Men's Choir Next On Summer Program Series

One of the highlights of the 1939 Summer Entertainment Series will be presented at the Assembly Hall on Tuesday, July 20, when the world-famous men's choir, "Marching Men of Song," come to College Station to give another one of their delightful programs of college songs, folk songs, and popular melodies.

The choir, composed of seven men, is already well known to many, as they have been touring leading colleges in the country for the past twelve years.

Through a provision in the summer school budget to take care of the expense of summer programs, this concert, as well as all the events of the Summer Entertainment Series, is being presented free

of charge. The program will be held at 10:10 Tuesday morning and classes will be suspended so that summer school students and faculty will be able to attend.

The Entertainment Series got into full swing on Tuesday, June 20, when Frank Speight, distinguished English actor, presented one of his entertaining Dickens Recitals. At the second of the series presented last Tuesday, Salmon Risk, the "Syrian Yankee," spoke to an enthusiastic audience on "The Americanization of an American."

On Wednesday, July 19, a moving picture "Man of Conquest" will be given for the annual Firemen's Short Course. On Thursday, July 20, Loring Campbell will present his magic show.

In addition to this program of events, other forms of entertainment are being planned for the summer school students including the softball games of the Twilight League.

### Cotton School Comes To a Close Tomorrow

The Summer Cotton School of A. & M. comes to a close tomorrow, when nine of the students enrolled will take examinations for federal cotton licenses which will be given by A. J. Watson, of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U.S.D.A., Memphis, Tenn.

Those passing the tests will be qualified to class cotton anywhere in the United States and will be recognized as experts in their profession.

AN ORDINANCE requiring licenses for motor vehicles used in transporting persons as passengers for hire within the city, providing the method for obtaining such licenses, prescribing conditions under which licensed vehicles shall be operated, providing conditions for suspension or revocation of licenses, prescribing penalties for violating various provisions of this ordinance, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of College Station, Texas:

Section 1.  
No individual, firm or corporation shall operate, or cause to be operated upon or over the highways, streets, or alleys within the city limits any service car, jitney, taxicab, bus or other motor vehicle for the transportation of persons as passengers for compensation or hire, unless there has been obtained for such vehicle and existing in full force and effect a license duly issued by the city. Violation of this section shall be punished by a fine in any amount not to exceed one hundred dollars, and every day such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

### Section 11.

In case any defendant pleads guilty or is convicted in Corporation Court of violating any provision of this ordinance, the Recorder may in addition to imposing a fine also order that the license for the vehicle involved be suspended or revoked.

### Section 12.

If any section or division thereof of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void, or invalid, the validity of the remaining portion of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

### Section 13.

The fact that the City of College Station has no ordinance in effect regulating the transportation of persons as passengers in motor vehicles over the streets and highways of the city constitutes an emergency requiring that the rule providing that ordinances shall be read at two meetings of the City Council before passage be suspended; and an emergency is hereby declared, and aforesaid rule is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately on and after it has been passed, approved and duly published.

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## Museum Gets Donation And Restores Collection



"Backwash Charlie," the two-month-old Boston terrier mascot of The Battalion, just can't decide what to do with this; it's got him baffled!

The bone is the leg bone of a prehistoric elephant. It is on exhibit in the A. & M. Museum, where work is going forward rapidly in restoring the famous collection made by the late Dr. Mark Francis, and in preparing a number of new specimens for exhibit.

### Francis Collection Being Restored, Old Skull Assembled

The famous collection of bones assembled by the late Dr. Mark Francis is now being restored at the College Museum where the collection is housed.

During his lifetime, Dr. Francis traveled all over the Southwest gathering together this collection, but it has never been completely worked over and displayed. An appropriation was recently granted for this purpose. In addition to the restoration of the bones, detailed drawings are being made of the collection.

Perhaps the most significant piece of work now being done is the restoration and assembling of the skull of a prehistoric elephant which was recently found by farmers near Pitts Bridge which is located near College Station. In attempting to excavate the skull it was broken into several pieces. However, the skull was sufficiently complete to enable paleontologists to assemble it authentically.

The work is being done largely by C. J. Hesse, assistant curator, and R. L. Peterson. The illustrations are being made by Hal Moseley.

A "guillotine" whose blade drops down a 90-foot tower upon automobile and truck tires is used at the New York World's Fair in resistance and durability tests.

### Geological Society Contributes \$500 for Work of Museum

The Geological Society of America has made a grant of \$500 to C. J. Hesse, assistant curator of the A. & M. Museum. This money is to provide the services of an artist to make suitable drawings of the more important specimens in the famous Mark Francis collection of fossil vertebrates. Mr. Hal Moseley of the Department of Architecture is making the drawings, a job that is expected to last most of the summer.

The funds from which the \$500 grant was made were provided by a bequest of the late R. A. F. Penrose, Jr., whose will gives some five million dollars to the Geological Society of America for aid in research. Much of Penrose's early geological work was done in Texas.
