Grade Points To Be Reduced For **Excess Absences**

The number of grade points earned by a student in any semester shall be reduced by one grade point in excess of the credit value of the course, effective with the 1939-40 session, according to changes in the college regulations enacted by the general faculty.

The new ruling reads as follows: "Each instructor in charge of a class or section shall keep a record of the work and attendance of its members and shall report the number of unexcused absences when he reports the grade in the subject.

"The Registrar shall reduce the number of grade points earned by a student in any semester by one grade point for each two unexcused absences in excess of the credit value of the course."
