Facilities Arranged ForCrowd

Both Mess Halls Will Be Open For **Visitors Thursday**

The first sell-out crowd ever to witness a game on Kyle Field and one of the largest in the history of the Southwest Conference will be on hand Thursday for the fortysixth renewal of the annual battle between the Texas Aggies, unbeaten and untied this year, and the Texas University Longhorns, who have had their most successful season since they won their last championship back in 1930.

All of the 38,336 seats, 5,000 more than the normal capacity of the stadium, have been sold, and no more tickets will be available, according to E. W. Hooker, secre tary of the Athletic Department.


With limited facilities for caring for such an overflow of humanity on the campus, certain difficulties are bound to arise. Some of the problems which will be confronted by visitors here are crowded streets and highways, limited eating facilities, limited parking space and lack of proper facilities for the orientation of the thousands of visitors who are unfamiliar with the campus.

To cope with these and other in conveniences, several rules and regulations were adopted by a committee formed for the purpose, which met in Col. Ike Ashburn's office Thursday.

To help keep the traffic situa tion from getting out of hand, Colonel Moore has requested that all College Station residents who own automobiles to refrain from driving them on Thursday, except in cases of emergency. In addition, approximately seventy A. & M. students have been appointed temporary military police to direct the heaviest traffic at strategic points
