ly beginning April 1, bearing interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum, with any unpaid balance being due by February 1, 1950.
The contract provided for the transfer of "all electric, water, and sewer utilities systems of Oakwood Addition, consisting of electric meters, poles, lines, and transformers; water mains and laterals and fire plugs; and sewer main and outfall lines and sewer disposal system, together with all fixtures, easements, franchises, leases, and rights in any wise appurtenant to aforesaid properties."

At the same meeting, a motion was passed by the Council instructing city garbage collector W. O. Richards not to trespass on people's property, not to try using impassable alleys for collections and not to collect garbage or trash not in containers reasonably possible to carry, or reasonably close to place of loading.
This motion will apply until the adoption of an ordinance of rules and regulations governing the collection of garbage, which the Council instructed City Attorney Barger and City Sanitary Engineer E. W. Steele to draw up.

Mr. Barger was also instructed to complete the city's gas franchise with the Community Natural Gas Company of Dallas.
Dr. F. L. Thomas of the Experiment Station was granted the city's permission to move some garages through the city streets—a permission now required of all local movers of buildings.
Announcement was made that the city of College Station has joined the Texas League of Municipalities.
Following is Mayor Binney's letter of resignation:

February 14, 1940
The City Council of College Station, College Station, Texas.
Gentlemen:
Although my term of office as

mayor does not expire until April 1941, it is my desire to be relieved of the responsibilities of the office for the following reasons:
1. Under the present plan two aldermen will be elected one year and three aldermen and a mayor the next. It is my belief that a better plan would be to have two aldermen and a mayor elected one year and three aldermen the next. This would call for the election of three members of the council each year. My resignation at this time will provide an opportunity for such a plan to be inaugurated at the April election.

2. Along with such other personal reasons as may exist for my resignation, I need only mention the fact that I have found that my duties as mayor prevent my having time to carry out certain plans that I have had in mind for a number of years. I have always made it a point not to neglect in any way my professional duties, but when a choice needed to be made between my personal business and social affairs and the affairs of the city, I have conscientiously decided in favor of the city. You will recall that my services did not begin with incorporation, but began about a year previously as chairman of the citizen's committee on incorporation. The work of this committee demanded a great deal of my time and effort. The demands of the office of mayor increase right along and I feel that I have devoted as much time and effort to

community affairs as I can afford. Therefore, I respectfully submit hereby my resignation as mayor to become effective at once, unless there is some reason for my continuing until my successor qualifies.
I want to express to you gentlemen and to each other official of the city, both past and present severally and collectively, my sincere appreciation for the cooperation you have given me. My associations and work with you, on the

whole, have been very helpful and pleasing to me.
To the citizens of College Station, who so generously accorded as a very great honor in electing me as their mayor, I am most humbly grateful. It is with deep regret and considerable hesitation, but not without a great deal of deliberation, that I have found it necessary to take this step.
