1914-15 he was in Vera Cruz, Mexico and then came back to the States to wait until America entered the World War. In 1917 he was with the 1st Division in France. He stayed there until Sept., 1918. From then until 1921 he was stationed in Ohio and was retired in that year. His rank at that time was master sgt. During the World War he was a 1st lieut enant and temporary captain.

In 1900 Sarge was wounded in service. The duty he was on when injured made him eligible for membership in the Order of the Purple Heart, but because of an oversight of the War Department he went through his remaining years in the army without receiving this honor.
