Here's How to Find Your Way Around the Alamo City

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 3.—For out of town guests who may have some difficulty in driving to Alamo Stadium for Saturday's gridiron classic between Texas A. & M. and Tulsa University, this airview picture should be retained as a guide. If you have tickets in Section A through M you will want to park near the main entrance on the west side. For sections M through Y the east entrance is your objective in parking your car.

But it will be easier to continue down Broadway to Incarnate Word Academy and turn right on Hildebrand Avenue to the Devine Road entrance to Stadium Circle.

Coming out from town you could follow Broadway to Hildebrand, but the best route south from the business section is via South St. Mary's street to Alameda Avenue, then to the Circle.

Or you can approach the circle from the South by driving through Brakenridge Park and taking the Alpine Drive up around the Sunken Garden and Open Air Theatre, the latter being directly below the south exit.
