The A. & I. Javelinas had defeated strong (?) little San Jose in California and had done it in a down pour of rain. Was this a true test of the porkers strength or was it just another game where the breaks and playing conditions told the difference or was it San Jose was a strong team last year.

Tulsa ran over Washburn 37 to 6, who the week before had held the Emporia Teachers scoreless and ran up the other side as high as they saw fit. Tulsa could surprise the Aggies as did the Beakrats over Rice last year and the North Texas Teachers against the improved Baylor Bears last Saturday.

**University of Texas Boasts Of Most Powerful Team Since 1937**

The crescendo of anguished cries arising from the nation's football coaches is not being augmented one whit by the basso profundo voice of Dana X. Bible, University of Texas mentor.

It isn't that Bible and his colleagues think they have a South-west conference champion, or even necessarily a contender for that honor—it's merely that they see their strongest squad: since they took over at Texas in 1937.

"This Texas team will be sounder than any we've had," was the way one coach expressed it.

Last year the Longhorns scrambled to a fair .500 conference average and an all-season record of five victories to four losses, by clinging to the flying coattails of two speedy scat backs, Cowboy Jack Crain and Galloping Gilly Davis. Crain is back for his junior season, and this trip it appears Texas will have a little something to go with him.

All of this adds up to a Texas team that should be even more dangerous than in '39, although it apparently lacks the all-around power to challenge seriously for the championship.

The Longhorns are deeper in capable reserves than at any previous stage of Bible's four-year tenure.

Right now Crain has as his back-field mates Pete Layden, letterman, at fullback, Vernon Martin at blocking back and any one of the four men at wingback: Letterman Noble Doss and Nelson Puett, Jr., Sophomores Ralph Park and Fritz Lobpries.

The wingback post has been beset by injuries, and all save Lobpries have missed some practices. This rugged 180-pounder appears to be one of the squad's hardest runners.

The first-string line includes Mike Sweeney and Malcolm Kutner at ends, Bo Cohenour and Stanley Mauldin at tackles, Co-Capt. Ted Dawson and Chal Daniel at guards, and Red Goodwin at center. All are lettermen except Cohenour, squadman, and Mauldin, sophomore.

Bidding earnestly against the current first-teamers are: Ends Charley Richardson, Jess Hawthorne and Wally Scott; Tackles Don Williams and Julian Garrett; Guards V. D. Basey and Harold Jungmohel; Center Glenn Jackson; Blocking Back Johnny Gill; Fullbacks Roy McKay, Lewis Mayne and R. L. Harkins, and Left Halves Spec Sanders, Walter Heap and R. B. Patrick. Co-Capt.
