REGISTRATION OF STUDENTS FOR SELECTIVE SERVICE
Place of Registration: All students registered in the College may register for the selective service at the Registrar's Office. This office will be open from 7 A. M. to 9 P. M. on Wednesday, October 16. All students regardless of residence may register here. It will not be necessary for any student to return to his home to attend to this duty.

Persons Required to Register: "Except as otherwise provided in this Act, it shall be the duty of every male citizen of the United States, and of every male alien residing in the United States, who, in the day or days fixed for the first or any subsequent registration, is between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-six, to present himself for and submit to registration at such time or times and place or places, and in such manner and in such age groups or groups, as shall be determined by rules and regulations prescribed hereunder."
Exemptions: Members of federally recognized active National Guard, the Officers' Reserve Corps, the Regular Army Reserve, the Enlisted Reserve Corps, the Naval Reserve, the Marine Corps Reserve, and cadets of the advanced course, senior division, Reserve Officers' Training Corps are exempt.—E. joint resolution, who has any person or persons dependent solely upon him for support, and who has no other means of support except the wages, salary or other compensation for personal services that he earns, may resign of shall be discharged upon his own request made within twenty days of the date of his entry into such active military service."
Deferment—There is no provision in the bill for deferment or resignation in the case of Reserve Officers or National Guardsmen who are without financial dependents or who hold the rank of captain or above. I understand, however, that deferment of from 6 to 12 months in the case of "key" teachers who come within this group can be made.

A serious penalty has been provided for those who fail to register at the appointed time and place. On conviction in Federal District Court for failure to register, the offender may be imprisoned for not more than five years or be subjected to a fine of \$10,000 or both.
Although any student may register here, all registrants must keep in touch with their local board after registration and must report to them immediately any change of address which they may have.

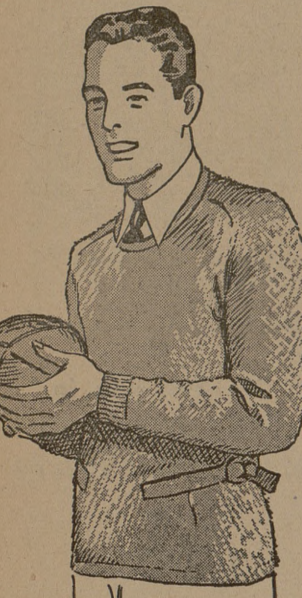
