The score was 39 to 31.

Jack Robinson, with 7 points, was high man for the Fish, while "Red" Clifton's aggressiveness showed up well near the close of the game.

Allen grabbed a small lead at the start of the game which they never relinquished. Led by Kunge and Martin, the Ramblers built up a 20 to 17 lead at the half. The second half gained momentum, but soon fell to a slow pace. Field goals by Martin, Mullins, and Furnace brought the score to 26 to 18.

The Fish started a rally near the close of the game to slash the Allen lead to a mere 4 points. Then they got too over-anxious, and missed many of their futile long shots or got them intercepted. Martin and Davis accounted for the last two field goals to bring the score to 39 to 31. Allen had possession of the ball as the game ended.

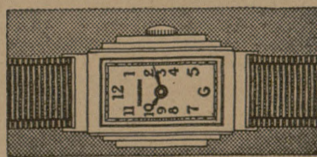

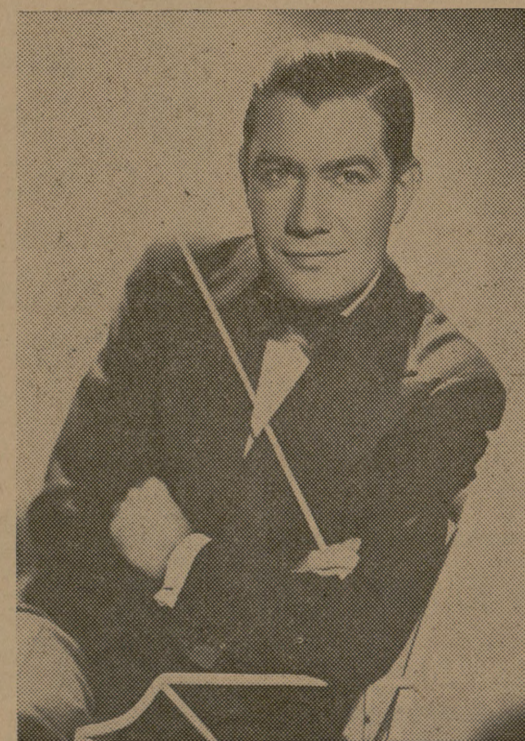
