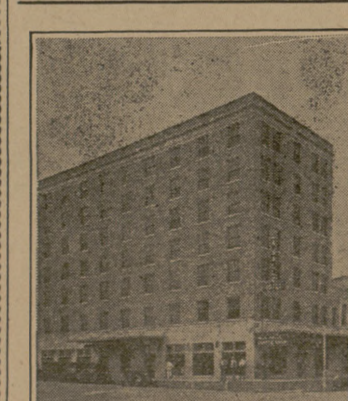

A. L. Darnell, professor in the agricultural programs, policy development, and post war reconstruction were to meet separately in afternoon sessions.  
Other speakers the committee heard before it adjourned late Wednesday were Richard C. Miller, farmer member from Jim Wells County; E. O. Sieck, director of the Texas Forest Service, College Station; and T. L. Smith of the office of plant and operations, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Dairy experts estimate that the number of milk cows on farms in the United States January 1, 1941, was about 25,800,000, or the largest number since 1935. The number is exceeded only by the period of 1933-35.
