OFFICE OF THE COMMANDANT
 CIRCULAR NO. 40:
 1. In compliance with the request of the committee in charge of the ENGINEER'S BALL, approved by the Organization Commanders concerned, RAMP S, D, E, F, G, and H, of WATSON HALL will be vacated on FRIDAY and SATURDAY nights, MARCH 28 and 29, 1941, in order to provide accommodations for visiting girls attending the ENGINEER'S BALL, and the CORPS DANCE on those nights.

2. Cadets having guests will be assessed a charge of \$10 per guest to cover cost of matrons, maid service, and other incidental expenses.

3. The Organization Commanders are charged with the responsibility for seeing that rooms and corridors are left in a neat, orderly condition for the reception of guests.

4. Cadets concerned will vacate WATSON HALL by 1:00 P. M., MARCH 28; guests will be admitted at 3:00 P. M. Cadets will be readmitted to the hall at 12:00 noon, MARCH 30, by which time guests must be out of the dormitory.

5. Guests staying in the dormitory must be in not later than 2:00 A. M. FRIDAY night, and not later than 2:00 A. M. SATURDAY night. Guests must check in with the matron upon their return to the dormitory after the dance. When reservations have been made for guests they will not be permitted to check out until departure for their homes. This will be done with the matron. Escorts will be held strictly accountable for compliance with these instructions.

6. Guests will not be permitted to occupy rooms that are not equipped with shades. Cadets making reservations should check with the occupants of the room to ascertain whether or not the room is equipped with shades and if not provide shades.

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 58
 AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THAT IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL TO ALLOW LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY TO RUN AT LARGE, REQUIRING THE CITY MARSHALL TO IMPOUND LIVESTOCK OR POULTRY FOUND RUNNING AT LARGE AND TO COLLECT A FEE AND REIMBURSEMENT FOR REDEMPTION OF IMPOUNDED LIVESTOCK OR POULTRY, PROVIDING FOR ADVERTISING, SALE, AND USE OF PROCEEDS THEREFROM, OF IMPOUNDED LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY NOT REDEEMED, IMPOSING A FINE FOR ALLOWING LIVESTOCK OR POULTRY TO RUN AT LARGE, AND DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS.
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any livestock or poultry to run at large and for the owner or keeper of any livestock or poultry to allow the same to run at large within the corporate limits of the city.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the city marshal to impound any livestock or poultry running at large.
SECTION 3. The owner or keeper of any livestock or poultry impounded under the terms of this ordinance may redeem or reclaim same by the payment to the city of a fee of two dollars for each head of livestock and fifty cents for each head of poultry, and in addition thereto by reimbursing the city for the expense incurred in connection with the impoundment of such livestock or poultry.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the city marshal to advertise for sale any livestock or poultry not redeemed or reclaimed by the owner or keeper within five days after such livestock or poultry has been impounded. Such notice of sale

shall be published once in the official newspaper of the city and shall give a description of the livestock or poultry to be sold and announce the time for the sale. Such date of sale shall be not less than five days nor more than ten days from the date of such publication.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the city marshal to sell to the highest cash bidder any livestock or poultry advertised for sale as provided in Section 4 hereof.

SECTION 6. Of the proceeds derived from the sale of any livestock or poultry under the terms of this ordinance, there shall be paid into the general funds of the city an amount necessary to cover the fees and reimbursement as provided in Section 3 hereof. The remainder shall be held in a special "Livestock and Poultry Fund" to be paid to the owner or keeper of the livestock or poultry sold, if same makes claim within a period of three months. In event such claim is not established within said time, such remaining proceeds shall then be forfeited to the city and be paid into the general funds.

SECTION 7. Any person who wantonly and willfully allows any livestock or poultry to run at large within the corporate limits of the city shall be fined not to exceed ten dollars (\$10) upon first conviction and not to exceed twenty-five (\$25) dollars upon each conviction thereafter. Each day that the owner or keeper of any livestock or poultry allows same to run at large shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 8. Without excluding any other types or classes, the term "livestock" as used in this ordinance shall include horses, mules, shetland ponies, and burros; cattle; sheep and goats; and hogs; and the term "poultry" shall include chickens, geese, ducks, guineas, turkeys, and pigeons.

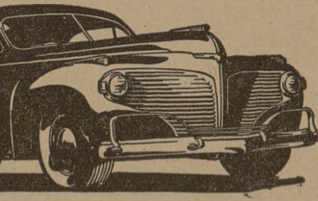
