There will be a very important meeting of the Horticultural Society Thursday Night 7:00 in room 147 Agricultural Building.

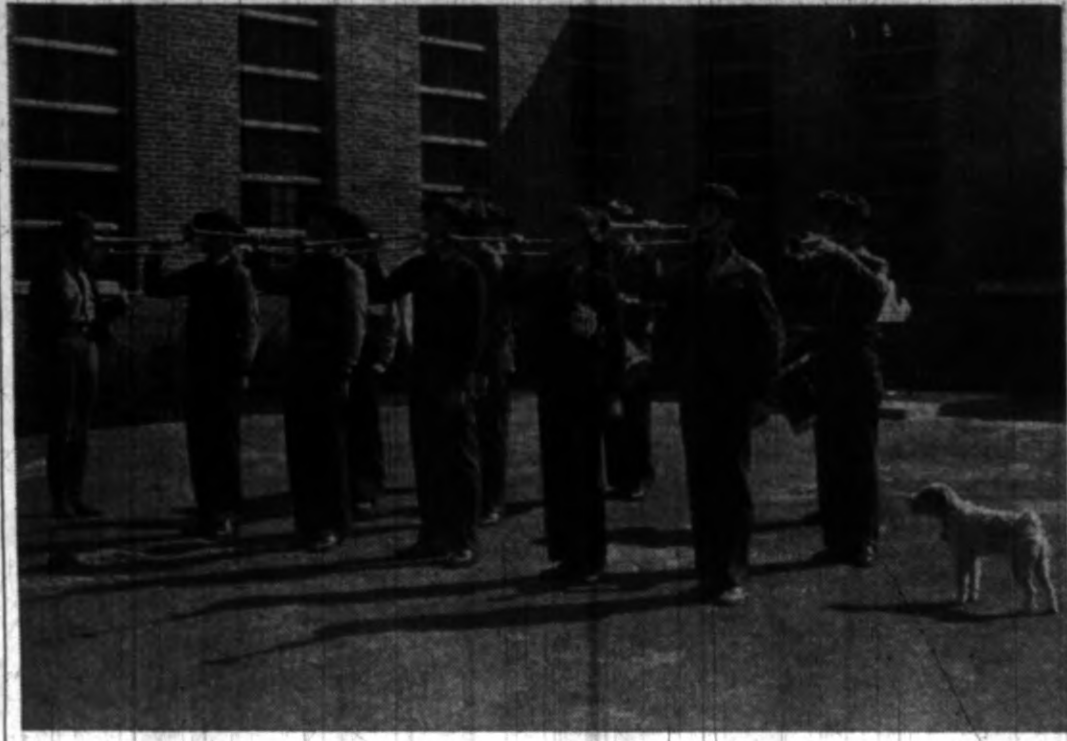
It is very urgent that all old members be present and a special invitation is given to all new majors in Horticulture.

With the first game of the rapidly approaching football season scheduled for next Saturday, the men who are responsible for the football team as well as the players themselves will come into the spotlight.

The man who is largely responsible for the physical condition of the players is Lilburn J. Dimmitt, better known as "Lil" Dimmitt. Even though his main job is head baseball coach, he has kept the men in such excellent condition that is hard to find anyone to take his place.

Lil, head baseball coach, assistant football coach, and trainer, is probably one of the best known figures in Texas athletic circles, having come to A. & M. in 1935 to take the position of trainer and assistant football coach which he has kept until this year when he will become head baseball coach.

After receiving his college education at Southwestern University at Georgetown, Lil took up cattle ranching for a time. Afterwards he was elected mayor of Georgetown, but he resigned that position in 1923 to go to Beaumont, Texas to take over the position of head coach at the Beaumont High school. He kept this position, except for one year when he coached at Lamar Junior College

Laundry will be turned in and delivered back to Sta. 1 according to the following schedule:

All students whose surnames begin with the letters: A B C D bundles in Saturday 7-9 a. m., bundles back Tuesday 3-5:30 p. m.; E F G H I bundles Monday 7-9 a. m., bundles back Wednesday 3-5:30 p. m.; J K L M N bundles in Tuesday 7-9 a. m., bundles back Thursday 3-5:30 p. m.; O P Q R S bundles in Wednesday 7-9 a. m., bundles back Friday 3-5:30 p. m.; T U V W X Y Z bundles in Thursday a. m., bundles back Saturday 1-3 p. m.

The schedule for Station 2 will be the same with one exception: All boys whose name begins with the letter A B C D will turn in their laundry Friday 7-9 a. m., and it will be delivered back Monday 3-5:30 p. m.

Laundry must be turned in and called for as scheduled as other laundry will be coming back on the following days and unless cleared there will be congestion at the laundry rooms. Students please note your respective dates and cooperate with us. All late or out-of-place bundles will have an extra charge of 15c.

Students will be allowed 25 pieces per week with a limit of 4 shirts, 2 pants, 1 coverall and 2 polo shirts. Shirts may be exchanged for pants. Mess hall jackets may be exchanged for pants. There will be charge on all excess pieces according to the following: Shirts 15c, pants 15c, polo shirts, coveralls 10c, jackets 10c and all small pieces 2c each.

Your dress shirts will receive special attention if brought down to the main laundry and called for for 15c.
