Civilian defense training groups here mostly under the direction of Lt. Colonel H. R. Courses are about 10 days long, and include an intensive drilling program in methods of meeting emergencies in case of bombing raids. The courses are intensely practical giving actual experiences to the men taking the course in as far as possible. Business men from all sections have returned to their homes prepared to take the lead in training others for emergencies.
