A storm was in progress between here and San Antonio and flight authorities advised against his making the trip by air which was the only means of transportation which would enable him to keep to his schedule as he was to be in Austin yesterday afternoon to attend a tea given for him by Dr. Homer Rainey, president of Texas university.

Because Lord Halifax would be unable to make the trip, the review originally scheduled for Wednesday was called off. Lord Halifax, formerly minister of supplies in England and chief of production, is spending his vacation at the King Ranch as guest of Bob Kleberg.
